### CARBIDE OF CALCIUM

Order in Council, dated 25th April, 1949, made under section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929.

BY THE GOVERNOR IN THE PRIVY COUNCIL OF  
NORTHERN IRELAND

WHEREAS by section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929 (a), the Governor of Northern Ireland is empowered by Order in Council to apply to any substance any of the provisions of that Act specified in the Order, with such modifications, if any, as may seem to the said Governor to be desirable, having regard to the nature of the substance to which the Order relates:

And whereas by the Petroleum (Carbide of Calcium) Order (Northern Ireland), 1930 (b), made under the powers aforesaid certain provisions of the said Act are applied with certain modifications to carbide of calcium;

And whereas the provisions of the said Act relating to conveyance by road are not by the said Order applied to carbide of calcium, and it seems to the said Governor to be desirable that the said provisions should be so applied;

And whereas by the said section nineteen any Order in Council made thereunder may be varied by any subsequent Order:

Now, therefore, I, William Spencer, Earl Granville, Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Vice-Admiral, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929, do hereby order as follows:

1. In Article 1 of the Petroleum (Carbide of Calcium) Order (Northern Ireland), 1930 (b) (which

applies the provisions of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929 (a), subject to modifications and with certain exceptions, to carbide of calcium) the words "to the conveyance of petroleum spirit by road" shall be omitted.

2. This Order may be cited as the Petroleum (Carbide of Calcium) Order (Northern Ireland), 1949, and shall come into operation on the second day of May, 1949.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport).

The Petroleum (Carbide of Calcium) Order (N.I.), 1930, applies the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (N.I.), 1929, to carbide of calcium, with the exception, amongst others, of the provisions which relate to the conveyance of petroleum spirit by road. This Order removes that exception.

### INFLAMMABLE LIQUIDS AND OTHER DANGEROUS SUBSTANCES

Order in Council, dated 25th April, 1949, made under section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929.

Whereas by section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929 (a), the Governor of Northern Ireland is empowered by

Order in Council to apply to any substance any of the provisions of the said Act specified in the Order :

And whereas it is desirable that certain provisions in the said Act should apply to the substances specified in the Schedule to this Order and to certain mixtures containing certain of those substances.

Now, therefore, I, William Spencer, Earl Granville, Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Vice-Admiral, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by section nineteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929, do hereby order as follows :—

1. Section 6, subsections (2) and (3) of section thirteen, section fourteen, section fifteen, section sixteen and section eighteen of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (Northern Ireland), 1929, shall apply to the substances specified in Parts I and II of the Schedule to this Order and to any mixture (not being a mixture of petroleum as defined in the Schedule to the Petroleum (Mixtures) Order (Northern Ireland), 1930 (b), which contains any of the substances specified in Part I of the said Schedule and which gives off an inflammable vapour at a temperature below seventy-three degrees Fahrenheit.

2. (1) This Order may be cited as the Petroleum (Inflammable Liquids and Other Dangerous Substances) Order (Northern Ireland), 1949, and shall come into operation on the second day of May, 1949.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889 (c), shall supply to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Parliament of Northern Ireland.

##### EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport).

This Order applies certain provisions of the Petroleum (Consolidation) Act (N.I.), 1929, to the substances specified. Under the enactments as applied the Minister of Home Affairs is empowered to make regulations as to the conveyance of the substances by road and for protecting persons and property from danger in connection with such conveyance. In addition, the enactments as applied require notice of certain accidents in connection with the substances to be given to the Minister of Home Affairs, empower him to direct an inquiry to be made in regard thereto, make provision in regard to inquests and confer certain powers on courts of summary jurisdiction and on government inspectors in relation to the substances.

#### GOVERNMENT OF NORTHERN IRELAND

##### CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIONS FOR THE SITUATIONS OF CLERICAL ASSISTANT, SHORTHAND TYPIST, TYPIST AND CALCULATING MACHINE OPERATOR IN THE CIVIL SERVICE OF NORTHERN IRELAND

##### 1. AGE.

Candidates for appointment as Clerical Assistants and Calculating Machine Operators must be of or over the age of 16 and under the age of 18 on the governing date for the competition.

Candidates for appointment as Shorthand Typists and Typists must be of or over the age of 16 and under the age of 28 on the governing date for the competition.

If a competition begins in one of the first six months of any year the governing date will be the 1st March in that year. If a competition begins in one of the last six months of any year the governing date will be the 1st September in that year.

Candidates may, however, deduct from their ages for the purpose of bringing them within the prescribed upper limit

- (a) any time served in the Women's Royal Naval Service, the Auxiliary Territorial Service or the Women's Auxiliary Air Force;
- (b) any time, not exceeding two years, served in an established situation in the Civil Service of Northern Ireland.

##### 2. SEX.

Only women and girls may compete under these Regulations. Candidates must be unmarried or widows and if appointed will be required to resign their appointments on marriage.

3. NATIONALITY.

Candidates must be either natural born or naturalised British subjects and must satisfy the Commissioners that they are ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom.

NOTE.—Candidates will be regarded as ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom if they can satisfy the Commissioners that they are domiciled therein or that since the 3rd September, 1939, their normal place of residence has been within the United Kingdom. A period of absence from the United Kingdom on National Service will not in itself prevent a candidate from being regarded as normally resident in the United Kingdom for this purpose.

4. HEALTH AND CHARACTER.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

NOTE.—All persons before being appointed to an established situation in the Civil Service of Northern Ireland are required to undergo a strict medical examination supplemented, when necessary, by an examination by a specialist. The object of the examination is to ascertain whether candidates are physically fit to perform the duties of the post and are likely to render continuous effective service until they attain the normal age for retiring on pension. Each case is considered on its merits and the Commissioners are not prepared to give prospective decisions on individual cases or to afford further information on the subject other than to point out that constitutional delicacy, poor physique, diseases of the heart and lungs, defective vision and hearing and persistent albuminuria may be causes for the rejection of a candidate. The Commissioners are empowered under certain conditions to modify the usual standard of physical fitness in favour of persons whose health has been impaired by service in H.M. Forces during war, or who have sustained a war service injury. Where a successful candidate fails on ground of health to satisfy the Commissioners that she is suitable for appointment to an established situation, the Commissioners may, if they consider that she is capable of performing the duties of the post satisfactorily for a reasonable period, offer her the option of an appointment on the conditions applicable to established officers, save in respect of sick leave and superannuation. Candidates appointed on these terms may later secure full establishment if their health record proves satisfactory. Further particulars may be obtained on application to the Commissioners.

Candidates will be required to obtain a certain

qualifying mark in these tests. This mark will be determined by the Commissioners.

NOTE.—A candidate for appointment as Shorthand Typist, Typist or Calculating Machine Operator may also compete for a post of Clerical Assistant but to do so she must take Three subjects in Part II. The subject or Subjects in Part II in which she obtains the highest marks will be used to determine her placing for appointment as Shorthand Typist, Typist or Calculating Machine Operator.

Part IV—Interview ... .. 200

Those candidates who, from the statements in their application forms appear to be eligible will be invited to undergo the written examination.

Of the candidates who obtain the highest total marks in the written examination a certain number to be determined by the Commissioners, will be summoned to the interview which is intended to test the candidate's alertness, intelligence and general outlook, as well as other personal qualities of value for situations in the Civil Service.

After each examination separate lists will be prepared of candidates competing for appointments as Shorthand Typists, Typists, Clerical Assistants and Calculating Machine Operators respectively, and the order of merit of the candidates in each of the four lists will be determined by the total marks they have obtained in the written examination and interview.

The number of appointments to be made will be decided by the Commissioners and the Ministry of Finance.

Each candidate will be examined at such time and place as the Commissioners may determine.

6. CANDIDATES TRAINED AS TEACHERS.

Candidates upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the Ministry of Finance has been notified to the Commissioners.

7. ASSIGNMENT.

The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of the candidates will, where possible, be taken into account. Candidates may be required to serve in any part of Northern Ireland.

8. FEES.

A fee of 5/- is payable by each candidate. This must be sent with the application form and is not returnable.

9. TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

Where the cost of travel at the lowest rate from any part of the United Kingdom to the examination centre exceeds £1, the amount of the excess will be refunded to the candidate.

10. GENERAL.

No person who is undergoing a course of study with the aid of a grant from public funds shall be eligible to compete before the completion of the course, unless she has previously obtained permission to do so from the authority which administers the grant.

Candidates must apply on the appropriate form within the time and in the manner of which notice is given by the Commissioners.

A candidate may apply to compete for more than one post at the same examination. Every candidate must state on her application form for which post or posts she desires to compete, and if she is competing for more than one must express her preference between them.

In offering an appointment to a candidate who is successful in the competition for two or more situations, the Commissioners will be guided by the candidate's order of preference as expressed in her application form; but such a candidate once appointed to a particular situation in accordance with this Regulation, will have no claim to any other, nor will a candidate who declines to accept an appointment offered to her have any claim to further consideration.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.
