LINEN AND COTTON EMBROIDERY WAGES COUNCIL
(NORTHERN IRELAND)

(28)) (S.R. & O. (N.I.), 1946, No. 211) and for the revocation of Order N.I.E. (28).

CHARITABLE DONATIONS AND BEQUESTS
ACT (IRELAND), 1871, SECTION 6

RANDALSTOWN AND DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION

Whereas under Section 1 of the Public Health and Local Government (Administrative Provisions) Act (Northern Ireland), 1946, the council of each county or county borough became the health authority for its area;

And whereas under Section 38 of the Health Services Act (Northern Ireland), 1948, it became the duty of each health authority to make adequate arrangements for securing the attendance of nurses for persons who need nursing in their own homes;

And whereas prior to the passing of the said Act of 1948 the Randalstown and District Nursing Association provided nurses for people in the Randalstown district who needed nursing in their own homes;

And whereas the Association on the 13th September, 1954, resolved, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland, to hand over its funds to the Antrim County Health Committee to be expended in the Randalstown district at the discretion of the Association, in providing comforts, nursing and other equipment not normally provided by the said Committee;

GILFORD AND DISTRICT NURSING SOCIETY

Whereas under Section 1 of the Public Health and Local Government (Administrative Provisions) Act (Northern Ireland), 1946, the council of each county or county borough became the health authority for its area;

And whereas under Section 38 of the Health Services Act (Northern Ireland), 1948, it became the duty of each health authority to make adequate arrangements for securing the attendance of nurses on persons who need nursing in their own homes;

And whereas prior to the passing of the said Act of 1948 the Gilford and District Nursing Society provided nurses for people in Gilford and district who needed nursing in their own homes;

And whereas the Society resolved, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland, to dispose of its funds as follows:

- (a) £250 to be used for the purchase of nursing equipment for the use of patients in Gilford and district being attended by the District Nurse;
- (b) the balance of the funds to be paid to the Management Committees of the following hospitals, in the proportions indicated, for providing comforts for patients from Gilford and district:
- (i) Banbridge Hospital, 75 per cent.
 - (ii) Downpatrick General Hospital, 12½ per cent.
 - (iii) Downshire Hospital, Downpatrick, 12½ per cent.
