WHEREAS by the Convict Prisons (Ireland) Act, 1854, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall and may be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant to set apart and appoint places of confinement for prisoners under sentence of penal servitude, and all such places of confinement so set apart and appointed, and all yards, offices, grounds and premises thereunto pertaining shall be held to be and considered "Convict Prisons":

And Whereas by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, the Orders made thereunder, and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, the powers of the Lord Lieutenant under the said Convict Prisons (Ireland) Act, 1854, are now exerciseable in Northern Ireland by the Governor of Northern Ireland:

Now We, the Lords Justices of Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by the said Acts, and of every other power enabling Us in this behalf, Do Hereby set apart and appoint the top ward of the left-hand wing, commonly called the B Wing, of Armagh Prison to be a place for the confinement of female prisoners under sentence or order of penal servitude.
