**CONSTABULARY ACT (NORTHERN  
IRELAND), 1922.**

**THE ROYAL ULSTER CONSTABULARY  
PENSIONS (AMENDING) ORDER, 1925.**

Dated 30th January, 1925.

I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by Section 2 of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, and by Sub-Section (1) of Section 4 of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919, as applied by the said Act of 1922, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, hereby order that Articles 7 and 13 of the said Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions Order, 1923, be cancelled as from the date hereof, and that the Articles subjoined hereto be substituted in lieu thereof:

And I certify that Sub-Section 2 of Section 4 of the Constabulary and Police (Ireland) Act, 1919, which provides that a draft of any Order proposed to be made under the said section shall be submitted to the representative body or bodies constituted by the Act, and representing any rank or ranks affected, and that before making the Order the Ministry of Home Affairs shall consider any representations made by such body or bodies, has been fully observed.

This Order may be cited as the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pension Order, 1925, and shall be construed as one with the Royal Ulster Constabulary Pensions Order, 1923:

**SCHEDULE REFERRED TO IN THE  
FOREGOING ORDER.  
SCALES OF PENSIONS, ALLOWANCES  
AND GRATUITIES.**

1. The pensions, allowances and gratuities payable under this Order shall be awarded by the Ministry with the consent of the Ministry of Finance, and shall be in accordance with the scales and provisions in the First Schedule hereto, and the general rules contained in Part III of that Schedule shall apply to such pensions, allowances and gratuities:

Provided that where a member of the force, or any widow, child or dependant of a member of the force receives any compensation in respect of the injury or death of the member, whether awarded under the Criminal Injuries (Ireland) Acts
