GOVERNMENT OF IRELAND ACT, 1920.

Notice is hereby given, that after the expiration of 40 days from the date hereof, it is proposed to submit to His Majesty in Council the draft of an Order in Council under section 69 of the above Act, entitled the Government of Ireland (Adjustment of Payments) Order, 1922.

Notice is hereby further given, that, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, copies of the aforesaid Order in Council can be obtained by any public body within 40 days of the date of this Notice at the Privy Council Office, Whitehall.

GOVERNMENT OF NORTHERN IRELAND. MINISTRY OF COMMERCE.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the first year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, entitled "An Act for granting a certain sum of money towards improving the Harbour of Donaghadee in Ireland, and rendering it a more fit situation for His Majesty's packets," it was enacted that the several persons theretofore appointed by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland for the time being, for the purpose of carrying into execution the provisions of the said Act, and such other person or persons as should or might from time to time be appointed or were authorised by the Lord Lieutenant or

other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being, should be and they were thereby appointed Commissioners for the purposes of the said Act, and that it should be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being to revoke the appointment of any such person or persons to be so appointed, and from time to time to nominate and appoint such Commissioner or Commissioners as such Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being shall think fit.

And whereas the powers and duties of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland in relation to Harbours were by the Ministry of Transport Act, 1919, and an Order in Council dated 26th April, 1920, transferred to the Ministry of Transport.

And whereas the functions hitherto discharged by the Ministry of Transport in relation to the matters hereinbefore mentioned are, by the operation of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and the Orders of His Majesty in Council, and directions of the Lord Lieutenant, made and given under the said Act, as from the 1st day of January, 1922, transferred to the Ministry of Commerce for Northern Ireland, in so far as the said functions relate to Irish Services in Northern Ireland.

The Ministry of Commerce hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in that Ministry as aforesaid, revokes the Warrant whereby Sir Philip Hanson, C.B.; Thomas Philip Lefanu, Esquire, C.B.; Andrew Robinson, Esquire, C.B.E., M.V.O., Commissioners of Public Works, were appointed Commissioners for the

purpose of the said first mentioned Act, and nominates, constitutes, and appoints—

Cecil Litchfield, Esquire;

Walter Abbott, Esquire;

George Herbert Edmeston Parr, Esquire, to be Commissioners for the purpose of the said Act of the first year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth.

GOLD AND ALUMINIUM BRONZE POWDERS.

*Board of Trade,
Great George Street,
London, S.W. 1.*

Committee under Part II of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921.

The Board of Trade give notice that they have received a complaint by Metal Powders, Ltd., supported by Radiant Products, Ltd., and the Aluminium Corporation, Ltd., that Gold (brass) Metal Powders in various shades, and Aluminium Powder, manufactured in Germany, are being sold or offered for sale in the United Kingdom, at prices which, by reason of the depreciation in the value in relation to sterling of German currency, are below the prices at which similar goods can be profitably manufactured in the United Kingdom, and that by reason thereof employment in the industry manufacturing similar goods in the United Kingdom is being, or is likely to be, seriously

affected. The Board of Trade, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Part II of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, have referred the matter for inquiry to a Committee, constituted for the purposes of that part of the Act, and consisting of—

Dr. J. H. Clapham, C.B.E. (Chairman);

Mr. F. J. Blakemore, F.G.I.;

Mr. J. T. Brownlie, C.B.E.;

Mr. J. W. Murray, D.L., and

Mr. Owen Parker, C.B.E., J.P.

The Committee are directed, after ascertaining the facts, to report to the President of the Board of Trade—

(a) whether the conditions specified in Section 2, Sub-section (1), of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, are fulfilled;

(b) on the effect which the imposition of a duty under Part II of the Act on goods of the class or description covered by the complaint would exert on employment in any other industry being an industry using goods of that class or description as material; and

(c) whether in the opinion of the Committee production in the industry manufacturing similar goods in the United Kingdom is being carried on with reasonable efficiency and economy.

The Committee propose to hold their first sitting for the taking of evidence at 11-30 a.m., on Tuesday, the 21st of February, 1922, at 5 Old Palace Yard, Westminster, London, S.W. 1.

WHEREAS by Section 62 of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Ireland) Act, 1877, the Lord Lieutenant is empowered by Order in Council to re-arrange the circuits in Ireland or to reduce their number and to direct what counties and towns shall be upon each circuit:

And whereas, by reason of the passing of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, it has become necessary to re-arrange the circuits formerly known as the North-East and North-West circuits:

Now, therefore, the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased, by and with the advice of the Privy Council in Ireland, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Circuit of Northern Ireland Order, 1921.
2. The North-East and North-West circuits shall as from the coming into operation of this Order cease to exist.
3. There shall be established a new circuit to be called "The Circuit of Northern Ireland."

4. The counties and towns upon the said circuit shall be the following:—The County of Antrim, the County of Down, the County of Armagh, the County of Fermanagh, the County of Tyrone, the County of Londonderry (and the County of the City of Londonderry).

NOTES.—The Exchequer Account of Northern Ireland is the general account of Receipts and Issues established under the Exchequer and Audit Act, 1921. The Exchequer Account is a cash account showing the financial position of the Northern Government at a certain date. The amounts shewn under "Revenue" are sums transferred from a subsidiary Revenue Account to the Exchequer after due provision for possible rebates and repayments has been made. Similarly, the amounts shewn under "Expenditure" are the issues made from the Exchequer on account of the Services administered by the various Departments, and, subject to balances in their hands, represent approximately the amounts expended by Departments out of such issues. Owing to the uneven flow of both revenue and expenditure the account is not necessarily an indication of the prospective position at the close of the financial year ending 31st March. During the present financial year revenue has accrued from a date earlier than those dates from which a number of services have been transferred and the necessary adjustments have not yet been made. The Residuary Share of Reserved Taxes is the net sum due to the Northern Government from the produce of taxes collected by the British Treasury and attributable to Northern Ireland after deduction of the Imperial contribution and the cost of Reserved Services. Under the Exchequer and Audit Act, 1921, the whole of the Receipts into the Exchequer form one general Consolidated Fund. Standing charges against the revenue of the year under Act of the Northern Parliament are shewn as Consolidated Fund Services. Other charges on revenue are voted by the House of Commons and are shewn as Supply Services.
