A PROCLAMATION.

For appointing Tuesday, July 12th, 1927,  
a Bank Holiday and a Public Holiday in  
Northern Ireland.

ABERCORN.

I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland in pursuance of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, the Holidays Extension Act, 1875, and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, and of every power Me thereunto enabling, Do Hereby Appoint Tuesday, the Twelfth day of July, next, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and as a Public Holiday in Northern Ireland, under and in accordance with the said Acts, and I do, by this Proclamation command the said day to be so observed, and all loving subjects of His Majesty to order themselves accordingly.

Given at the Council Chamber, Government House, Hillsborough, this 19th day of May in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Seven.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTHERN

WHEREAS by Clause 3 of an Order made by the Governor of Northern Ireland, dated the 11th day of July, 1923, it was provided that the qualifications of all persons proposed to be appointed to any situation in the Civil service of Northern Ireland should, before those persons were appointed, be approved by the Civil Service Commissioners for Northern Ireland, and that no person should be so appointed until a certificate of his qualifications had been issued by the said Commissioners:

And Whereas it was laid down in proviso (a) to the said Clause that the foregoing provision should not apply to any of the situations specified in the Schedule to the said Order:

And Whereas the said Schedule included (amongst other situations) all situations in a Department filled in the customary course of promotion by persons previously serving in that Department, and all temporary situations.

And Whereas it was further laid down in proviso (b) to the said Clause that it should not be necessary for any person who at the date of the Order held a certificate of qualification from the Civil Service Commission of the United Kingdom to obtain a new certificate of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners for Northern Ireland on being appointed either by transfer or promotion to a situation which, in the opinion of the last-mentioned Commissioners, was similar to the situation in respect of which he already held a certificate or might properly be filled in customary course of promotion from the class or grade of situation in respect of which the existing certificate was issued:
