REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR CADETSHIPS IN THE ROYAL ULSTER CONSTABULARY.

The Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland hereby gives notice that he has made the following regulations in exercise of the powers conferred on him by the Constabulary

Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, respecting open competitive examinations for Cadetships in the Royal Ulster Constabulary.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for these appointments are 19 and 23. Candidates must, without exception on any ground, be of the prescribed age on the 1st August of the year in which they are examined. They must be unmarried and at least 5 feet 8 inches in height with adequate chest measurement.

2. No person shall be deemed eligible for the examination who shall not satisfy the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland—

(a) That his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Royal Ulster Constabulary.

(b) That he is a European British subject.

(c) That if he (being a European British Subject) or his father or his mother was not born within His Majesty's dominions and allegiance then at the time of his birth his father was a British subject and that such father still is or continued to be till his death a British Subject.

3. The examination will be held by the Imperial Civil Service Commissioners, and the subjects of the examination and the maximum number of marks obtainable for each subject will be as follows:—
