A candidate may not offer more than two subjects in Part II. Except as provided below in the case of languages, no candidate may offer similar subjects in Parts I and II; that is to say, a candidate taking Physics or Chemistry or Biology may not offer Everyday Science; a candidate taking Lower or Higher Mathematics may not offer Elementary Mathematics; and a candidate taking Modern History may not offer General History. A candidate may not offer the same language in Part I and Part II, nor may he offer more than two foreign languages in all. The modern languages that may be offered as subject (4) are French, German, Italian, Spanish and Russian.

In addition to the above-named subjects, a candidate may take up either freehand drawing or geometrical drawing, each of which carries 50 marks.

A candidate must obtain 140 marks in Interview and Record, and such aggregate of marks in the whole examination as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. Candidates who are successful in the literary examination will be required, shortly after the result of that examination is declared, to undergo a strict examination by the Medical Officer of the Royal Ulster Constabulary as to their physique and capacity for active outdoor work in the Royal Ulster Constabulary.

5. Such competitors as attain the highest aggregate of marks will be appointed to the rank of Cadet, provided that they obtain the minimum aggregate of marks (see para. 3) and that they pass the medical examination and satisfy the requisite conditions in other respects.

6. It is an ordinary condition of appointment that a successful candidate shall provide himself, or be provided by his parents or guardians with uniform or the cost thereof. A contributory grant of £50 will be made towards the cost of uniform on appointment to the rank of District-Inspector.

7. Cadets are appointed only on probation, and shall not be attached permanently to the Royal Ulster Constabulary until they attain the rank of District-Inspector. Promotion will not be made to this rank until the Inspector-General, Royal Ulster Constabulary, is satisfied that they have made sufficient progress in the knowledge of their duties and that they are competent to undertake the responsibilities of the position of District-Inspectors. During the period of probation their services may be dispensed with in consequence of unfavourable reports received of their conduct or proficiency while undergoing instruction or of their character and position previous to appointment as Cadets.

8. Applications for permission to attend an examination must be made at such time and in such manner as the Minister of Home Affairs may appoint.

The Minister of Home Affairs also gives notice of the following order made by the Imperial Civil Service Commissioners in connection with examinations for Cadetships in the Royal Ulster Constabulary.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, in pursuance of Clause 13 of the General Regulations under the Order in Council of 22nd July, 1920, that with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury they have prescribed:—

(1) That the following fees shall be payable by candidates attending examinations for Cadetships in the Royal Ulster Constabulary:—

If examined in London ... .. £4

If examined elsewhere than in London £5

(2) That when the above-mentioned examination is held concurrently with the examination for appointments in the Indian Police Service or the examination in connection with the selection of Police Probationers for service in Ceylon, the Straits Settlements, the Federated Malay States and Hong Kong, and of Sub-Inspectors of Constabulary for service in British Guiana, Trinidad and Jamaica, or the examination for the selection of Probationers for the Customs Service of the Federated Malay States, the following fees shall be payable by candidates admitted simultaneously to two or more of those examinations:—
