A PROCLAMATION.  
FOR APPOINTING FRIDAY, JULY 12th, 1929, A BANK HOLIDAY AND A PUBLIC HOLIDAY IN NORTHERN IRELAND.

I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, Knight of The Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland in pursuance of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, the Holidays Extension Act, 1875, and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, and of every power me thereunto enabling, do hereby appoint Friday, the Twelfth day of July next, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and as a Public Holiday in Northern Ireland, under and in accordance with the said Acts, and I do, by this Proclamation command the said day to be so observed, and all loving

subjects of His Majesty to order themselves accordingly.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTHERN IRELAND.  
ABERCORN.

WHEREAS it is provided by the Government of Ireland (Election Laws Adaptation) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1922, Article 3 (2) that:—

For the purpose of an election of members to serve in the House of Commons of the United Kingdom for any county constituency named in Part II of the Fifth Schedule to the Act:—

- (a) if the constituency consists of a single county, the under-sheriff of the county shall be the returning officer;
- (b) if the constituency consists of two counties or of a county and a borough, such one of the under-sheriffs of the said counties or of the said county and borough as may be nominated by the Lord Lieutenant shall be the returning officer, but either of the other under-sheriffs shall, if he so desires, be appointed by the returning officer to act in his behalf as assistant returning officer for the purpose of the execution of any powers and duties in the part of the constituency within the jurisdiction of such under-sheriff, other than powers and duties which require to be executed by the re-
