ORDER OF THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE NORTHERN IRELAND.

(Dated 25th July, 1922).

THE DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS AND PESTS (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER OF 1922.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

Commencement.

1. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of September nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

Definitions.

2. In this Order:—“The Ministry” means the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland; “Inspector” means an Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland; “Authorised person” means any person authorised by the Ministry; and the expression “plant” shall, where the context permits, include tree and shrub and the fruit, seeds, tubers, bulbs, layers, cuttings or other parts of a plant.

Restriction on Importation of Plants.

3. (i) The landing in Northern Ireland from any country other than England and Wales

Scotland and the Channel Islands of any of the plants mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order is prohibited except in accordance with the regulations set out in the Third Schedule hereto.

(ii) The importer of any plant the landing of which is regulated by this Article shall comply with the Regulations set out in the Third Schedule hereto.

(iii) This Article shall not apply to any plant the landing of which is authorised by a general licence issued by the Ministry or by a special licence issued by an Inspector or other authorised person or to a consignment of a plant to the Ministry for experimental or scientific purposes.

Powers of Entry.

4. An Inspector or other authorised person may, upon production if so required of his appointment or authority, enter any premises and examine any plant on such premises which has been landed in Northern Ireland from any country except as aforesaid or on which he has reason to believe that an insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order exists or has recently existed.

Precautions to be adopted in case of Disease.

5. (1) An inspector or other authorised person may at any time, and from time to time, by a Notice served on the occupier of premises on which he has reason to believe that there is any plant attacked with any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order require him to adopt such measures for prevention of the spread of the insect or pest as are specified in the Notice.

(2) A Notice under this Article may prescribe the time within which the adoption of any measure thereby prescribed shall be completed.

Power to deal with living specimens of Insects or pests.

6. No person shall land, sell, or offer for sale, a living specimen of any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, except with the written permission of the Ministry, and an Inspector or other authorised person may, by a Notice served on any person having in his possession, or under his charge any such living specimen, require him to adopt such measures for the prevention of the spread of the insect or pest as are specified in the Notice.

Services of Notices, etc.

7. For the purpose of this Order, a Notice shall be deemed to be served on any person if it is delivered to him personally, or left for him at his last known place of abode or business, or sent through the post in a letter addressed to him there; and a Notice purporting to be signed by an Inspector or other authorised person shall be *prima facie* evidence that it was signed by him.

Information to be given as to Diseased Plants or parts thereof.

8. Every person who has or has had in his possession, or under his charge any plant which is attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman, or otherwise has sold, or offered for sale any such plant shall, if so required in writing by the Ministry or an Inspector, or other authorised person, give to the Ministry or Inspector, or other authorised person, all such information as he possesses as to the persons in whose possession, or under whose charge the plant is or has been; provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

Offences.

9. (1) Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who does any act in contravention of this Order or the Regulations in the Third Schedule to this Order or any Notice served on him under this Order, or fails to do any act which he is required to do by this Order, or the said Regulations or any such Notice.

(2) This Article does not apply to the landing, or attempted landing of anything in contravention of this Order, the penalty for which is provided by Section 1 of the Destructive Insects Act, 1877, as amended by the Destructive Insects and Pests Act, 1907.

Revocation of Order.

10. (1) Clause 6 of the American Gooseberry Mildew and Black Currant Mite (Ireland) Order, 1912, and Clause 3 (1) of the Potatoes Importation (Ireland) Order, 1920, in so far as they concern bushes and potatoes coming from places other than England and Wales, Scotland, and the Channel Islands are hereby revoked.

(2) The Foreign Potatoes (Ireland) Order, 1910, is hereby revoked, provided that such revocation shall not :—

(a) affect the previous operation of these Orders, or anything duly done, or suffered thereunder; or

(b) affect any right, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued or incurred thereunder; or

(c) affect any penalty incurred in respect of any offence committed against such Orders; or

(d) affect any investigation, legal proceeding or remedy in respect of any such right, privilege, obligation, liability or penalty as aforesaid.

and any such investigation, legal proceeding or remedy may be instituted, continued, or enforced, and any such penalty may be imposed as if this Order had not been made.

Application of the Order.

11. This Order shall apply to Northern Ireland.

Short Title.

12. This order may be cited as the DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS AND PESTS (NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER OF 1922.

(a) All living plants with a persistent woody stem above ground, and parts of the same, except seeds, when for use in propagation, such as fruit trees, stocks and stools, forest trees, and ornamental shrubs and grafts, layers and cuttings thereof.

(b) All potatoes; and all tubers, bulbs, rhizomes, corms, and hopstocks for planting.

(c) Seeds of onions and of leeks for sowing.

(d) Gooseberries.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

Regulations Governing the Importation of Plants into Northern Ireland.

1. The restrictions on landing imposed by the Order and these Regulations do not apply to plants, the landing of which is authorised by a general licence issued by the Ministry or by a special licence issued by an Inspector or other authorised person, or to consignments of plants to the Ministry for experimental or scientific purposes.

Inspection and Certification as a Condition of Entry.

2. (a) In the case of an importation of plants, otherwise than through the post, from a country whose service of plant inspection is recognised for the time being, each consignment must be accompanied by two copies of a certificate issued after inspection, and not more than 14 days prior to the date of shipment, by a duly authorised official of the country whence the plants are exported in the form prescribed below. One copy of the certificate must be produced to the Customs Officer at the port of entry, and the other copy must be forwarded by the importer to the consignee. In the case of consignments imported through the post, a copy of the prescribed certificate need not be produced to the Customs Officer, but a copy must be affixed to each package.

The original of the certificate must be forwarded by post before the plants are despatched, by the exporter to the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland, Wellington Place, Belfast.

Certificate of Examination of Plants No.

This is to certify that the plants included in the package or consignment described below were thoroughly inspected by a duly authorised official of _____ on _____ and were found, or believed by him to be healthy and free from any of the plant diseases or pests named in the Second Schedule to the Destructive Insects and Pests (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922.

This additional certificate must be given for all potatoes :—

Further, it is hereby certified that no case of the disease, known as Wart Disease or Black Scab of potatoes (*Synchytrium endobioticum*) has occurred on the farm or holding where the potatoes included in this consignment were grown nor within 500 yards (approximately ½ kilometre) thereof.

An Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland or other authorised person, may open and examine the contents of any consignment or package imported or believed to have been imported into Northern Ireland, notwithstanding the fact that the consignment may be accompanied by, or the package may have attached thereto, the duly authorised copy certificate.

(b) In the case of an importation of plants from a country where no recognised service of plant inspection is maintained, and in the case of a consignment of plants which is not accompanied by copy certificates as above mentioned, or of a package of plants imported through the post to which a copy certificate is not attached the plants shall be retained by the importer or consignee until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland or other authorised person, at a suitable place designated by the Inspector or other authorised person, or by the Ministry, and certified in writing to be healthy and free from the insects and pests mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, or until their removal has been authorised in writing by the Ministry or by an Inspector of the Ministry or other authorised person.

(c) Any imported plants, which, on inspection, are found to be unhealthy or attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, and which, in the judgment of the Inspector or other authorised person, cannot be cleaned by disinfection or other treatment, shall, with the packing and package, either be destroyed or returned to the country of exportation by the importer thereof.

(d) When disinfection or other treatment of the plants is allowed, it shall be carried out by the importer, and under the supervision of an Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland or other authorised person at a suitable place designated by the Inspector or other authorised person or the Ministry, and no part of the consignment shall be moved from the place designated without the written consent of the Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland, or other authorised person.

(e) The Ministry's charge for the services of the Inspector or other authorised person and all charges for storage, cartage, and labour, incident to inspection and disinfection, shall be paid by the importer.

3. Plants will not be deemed to be healthy which are attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule, and the Note to the Sale of Diseased Plants (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922.

NOTES.—The Exchequer Account of Northern Ireland is the general account of Receipts and Issues established under the Exchequer and Audit Act, 1921. The Exchequer Account is a cash account showing the financial position of the Northern Government at a certain date. The amounts shewn under "Revenue" are sums transferred from a subsidiary Revenue Account to the Exchequer after due provision for possible rebates and repayments has been made. Similarly, the amounts shewn under "Expenditure" are the issues made from the Exchequer on account of the Services administered by the various Departments, and, subject to balances in their hands, represent approximately the amounts expended by Departments out of such issues. The Residuary Share of Reserved Taxes is the net sum due to the Northern Government from the produce of taxes collected by the British Treasury and attributable to Northern Ireland after deduction of the Imperial contribution and the cost of Reserved Services. Under the Exchequer and Audit Act, 1921, the whole of the Receipts into the Exchequer form one general Consolidated Fund. Standing charges against the revenue of the year under Act of the Northern Parliament are shewn as Consolidated Fund Services. Other charges on revenue are voted by the House of Commons and are shewn as Supply Services. The sum shown above under "British Grant in aid of Revenue" is part of the Grant of £1,000,000 in aid of Northern Revenues included in the Estimates of the United Kingdom, under head of Unclassified Services, Vote 8.

ORDER, Dated 31st July, 1922, by the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland prescribing certain Public Departments for the purposes of Section 8 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, and prescribing Form of Declaration to be made by Applicants for payment of sums due from or payable by any Public Department under the said Section.

Whereas it is provided by Section 8 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, that "on the death of a person to whom any sum not exceeding one hundred pounds is due from a public department in respect of any civil pay, superannuation, or other allowance, annuity or gratuity, then if the prescribed public department so direct, but subject to the regulations (if any) made by the Treasury, probate or other proof of the title of the personal representative of the deceased person may be dispensed with, and the said sum may be paid or distributed to, or among, the persons appearing to the public department to be beneficially entitled to the personal estate of the deceased person, or to, or among, any one or more of those persons, or, in the case of the illegitimacy of the deceased person or his children, to, or among, such persons as the department may think fit, and the department shall be discharged from all liability in respect of any such payment or distribution."

And whereas it is provided by Section 1 of the Superannuation Act, 1914, that the provisions of the section above recited shall apply to the gratuities payable to the legal personal representatives of a deceased civil servant under Section 2 or Section 3 of the Superannuation Act, 1909 :

And whereas it is provided by Section 12 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, that the expression "prescribed public department" means as respects any matter the department prescribed for the purpose of that matter by the Treasury.

And whereas it is provided by Section 1 of the Superannuation Act (Northern Ireland) 1921, that in the Superannuation Acts 1834 to 1914 as applied to the Civil Servants of Northern Ireland, the Ministry of Finance shall be substituted for the Treasury.

Now, therefore, the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland by virtue of the powers hereinbefore mentioned is pleased to prescribe the following public departments for the purposes of Section 8 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, namely :—

Every Ministry which, for the time being, is shown in the Parliamentary Estimates for Northern Ireland as liable to account for a Vote or Votes of the Parliament of Northern Ireland.

And the Ministry is further pleased to direct that applications for payments of sums due from or payable by any Ministry under this Section aforesaid shall be accompanied by a Declaration made in the form shown in the Schedule to this Order.

This Order shall have effect forthwith, and all Orders heretofore made by virtue of Section 8 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, are hereby (except in so far as they affect a "transferred Irish Officer" as defined by Section 4 of the Superannuation Act (N.I.) 1921) revoked and annulled without prejudice to anything done thereunder.

FORM OF DECLARATION.

SCHEDULE.

The following area within the County of the City of Belfast—that is to say—The area enclosed by and including the following roads and streets—Oldpark Road, from the south-east corner of St. Silas's Church to Louisa Street, Louisa Street, thence in a straight line from the end of Louisa Street to the south-west end of Ardilea Street, and thence in a straight line to Oldpark Road at St. Silas's Church, but not including St. Silas's Church.

THE SALE OF DISEASED PLANTS

(NORTHERN IRELAND) ORDER OF 1922.

The Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in it under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf, orders, and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

Definitions.

1. In this Order :—“ The Ministry ” means the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland ; “ Inspector ” means an Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland ; “ Authorised person ” means any person authorised by the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland.

The expression “ plant ” shall include tree and shrub and the seeds, tubers, bulbs, layers, cuttings or any other parts of a plant.

Prohibition of Sale of Diseased Plants etc.

2. No person shall sell, offer or expose for sale or cause to be sold, offered or exposed for sale for planting, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order.

Information to be given as to Diseased Plants.

3. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman or otherwise has had in his possession for sale or has sold, offered or exposed for sale, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, shall, if so required in writing by the Ministry or by an Inspector or authorised person, give the Ministry or the Inspector or authorised person, as the case may be, all such information as he possesses as to the person in whose possession or under whose charge such plant is or has been ; provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

Powers of Entry.

4. An Inspector or authorised person may, upon production if so required of his appoint-

ment or authority, enter any premises on which he has reason to believe that an insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order exists or has recently existed, and examine any plant on such premises.

Action to be taken to prevent sale or movement of Diseased Plants.

5. Any auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman, or other person, on becoming acquainted or being informed by the Ministry, by an inspector, or authorised person that he has in his possession or under his charge any plant substantially attacked by an insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, shall take steps to prevent the sale or movement of such plant, except under the authority of an Inspector or authorised person.

Powers to Order Destruction or Disinfection.

6. (1) An Inspector or authorised person may at any time by notice served on any person who as auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman, or otherwise has in his possession for sale or who offers or exposes for sale or causes to be offered or exposed for sale for planting any plant which is substantially attacked by an insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, require him to adopt such measures as are authorised by this Article and Specified in the notice.

(2) A notice under this Article may require the auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman, or other person named in the notice to adopt one or more of the following measures, that is to say:—

(a) to destroy the whole or any part of the plant by fire or such other suitable method as may be specified in the notice;

(b) to disinfect the plant to the satisfaction of the Inspector or authorised person;

(c) to take such other steps as the Inspector or authorised person may consider necessary to prevent the spread of disease;

(3) Any such notice may appoint the time within which the adoption of any measure thereby prescribed shall be completed.

Service of Notices, etc.

7. For the purpose of this Order a notice shall be deemed to be served on any person if it is delivered to him personally or left for him at his last known place of abode or business, or sent through the post in a letter addressed to him there; and a notice purporting to be signed by an Inspector or authorised person shall be *prima facie* evidence that it was signed by him as an Inspector or authorised person.

Penalties.

8. Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who—

1. sells, offers, or exposes for sale or causes to be sold, offered or exposed for sale for planting any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order; or

(2) fails to take such steps as are required under Articles 5 and 6 of this Order, or fails to give information as required by Article 3; or

(3) wilfully obstructs or impedes any Inspector or authorised person when acting under this Order.

Application of the Order.

9. This Order shall apply to Northern Ireland.

Short Title.

10. This Order may be cited as the Sale of Diseased Plants (Northern Ireland) Order of 1922.

Commencement of Order.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of September, 1922.
