### CONSTABULARY (IRELAND) ACT, 1922.

I, The Right Honourable Edmund Bernard Viscount FitzAlan of Derwent, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, in pursuance of the Constabulary (Ireland) Act, 1922, do hereby fix the thirty-first day of August, nineteen hundred and twenty-two, to be the day for the disbandment of the Royal Irish Constabulary.

### ORDER.

WHEREAS, by Regulation 26, contained in the Schedule to the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, it is provided that the Civil Authority may, by Notice, prohibit the circulation of any newspaper for any specified period, and that any person circulating or distributing such newspaper within such specified period shall be guilty of an offence against the Regulations in said Schedule.

Now, I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, do hereby prohibit the circulation of the paper entitled "The Irish Catholic" in Northern Ireland, until the 18th day of September, 1922.

BY virtue and in pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in Us by the provisions of the Petty Sessions Clerk (Ireland) Act, 1858, Section 29, the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and all other powers Us thereunto enabling, We do hereby make the following General Rules for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Petty Sessions Clerk (Ireland) Act:—

From the date of this Order the limits of age of candidates seeking the appointment of Petty Sessions Clerk in Northern Ireland shall be 41 to 50 years, except—

- (a) In the case of a candidate who is already a Petty Sessions Clerk, the limits of age shall be 41 to 55 years.
- (b) In the case of any candidate who is serving or has served in the Royal Irish Constabulary or the Royal Ulster Constabulary, his services therein having been satisfactory, the limits of age shall be 25 to 55 years.
- (c) In the case of any person who, at the time of his application is serving in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or who since the beginning of the late war has been discharged from service in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, his service in such Force having been satisfactory: or in the case of an applicant who has served for over six months in the Ulster Special Constabulary, his service in this Force having been satisfactory, the limits of age shall be 25 to 50 years.
- (d) In the case of a female candidate the limits of age shall be 25 to 40 years.

The Rules heretofore made as to the age limits of candidates for the position of Petty Sessions Clerk in Northern Ireland are hereby revoked.
