veterinary health certificate completed by a private veterinary surgeon who holds an appointment as a Local Veterinary Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, within 36 hours prior to export to the effect that:

- (i) a written declaration has been received from the exporter that the pigeons (which must be identifiable as those described on the health certificate) had been on the exporter's premises throughout the 35 day period immediately preceding the date of export;
- (ii) the pigeons for export together with all other birds on the exporter's premises were clinically inspected not more than 48 hours prior to the export and no clinical signs or symptoms of infectious or contagious disease were found and the pigeons to be exported were healthy and fit to travel;
- (iii) after due enquiry, and to the best of the certifying veterinarian's knowledge and belief, no case of infectious or contagious disease has occurred on the exporter's premises during the 6 week period preceding the date of export;
- (iv) after due enquiry, having examined the relevant loft vaccination certificate and to the best of the certifying veterinarian's knowledge and belief the pigeons identified in the schedule of the certificate are fully vaccinated against Paramyxovirus infection of pigeons using an officially approved inactivated vaccine in accordance with the vaccine manufacturer's instructions.
- The container in which the pigeon(s) is/are imported must be constructed so as to allow an Imports Inspector to check the numbers and breeds of pigeon(s) contained therein. The container must either be new or thoroughly cleansed and disinfected and be suitable for the purpose.
- 3. The health certificate referred to in paragraph 1 above must be presented to an Imports Inspector of the Department immediately on arrival in Northern Ireland.
- The pigeon(s) must not be removed from the port/airport of disembarkation until checked by an Imports Inspector.
- The pigeon(s) must be moved direct from the port/airport of disembarkation to the premises of destination as shown on the health certificate referred to in paragraph 1 above.
- The importer must inform the Divisional Veterinary Officer for the premises of destination within 24 hours of importation or if importation is on a Saturday, Sunday or Public Holiday, on the first working day thereafter.

This licence is valid until further notice or unless the licence is revoked by the Department.
