EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This note is not part of the Order)

This Order lays down the functions of the Civil Service Commissioners for Northern Ireland ("the Commissioners"). Under section 36(1) of the Northern Ireland Constitution Act 1973, any appointment to the office of Civil Service Commissioner for Northern Ireland shall be by Her Majesty.

The principal provisions of this Order are:-

- 1. Article 3 provides that, apart from permitted exceptions, all appointments to the Northern Ireland Civil Service ("the Civil Service") shall be made on merit on the basis of fair and open competition (the "merit principle").
- 2. Article 4 provides for the Commissioners to maintain the merit principle, to prescribe exceptions to it, and to prescribe and publish a recruitment code on the interpretation of the merit principle. This Article also provides for the Commissioners to audit recruitment to the Civil Service, and to require the publication of information on Civil Service recruitment.
- 3. Article 5 provides for Commissioners to consider and determine appeals to them by a civil servant under the Code of Ethics.
- 4. Article 6 provides that no appointment shall be made to the Senior Civil Service, or such other situations in the Civil Service as the Commissioners may prescribe, without the approval of the Commissioners.
- 5. Article 7 allows any function of the Commissioners to be exercised by one or more of the Commissioners and allows the Commissioners, in relation to such matters as they may specify, to authorise any person to act on their behalf. The Article also requires the Secretary of State to make provision to support the work of the Commissioners.

Roads (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1999

Notice is hereby given that the Department of the Environment for Northern Ireland in exercise of the powers conferred on it by section 2(2) of the European Communities Act 1972 and of all other enabling powers made on 3rd March, 1999, an Order entitled Roads (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1999 (S.R. 1999 No. 89) which will come into operation on 14th March, 1999.

The purpose of the regulations is to implement Council Directive 97/ 11/EC of the 3rd March, 1997 (O.J. No. L73, 14.3.97, p.5) on the assessment of the effects of certain public and private projects on the environment in respect of those proposals to construct new roads and to improve roads to which the Directive applies. The Directive amends Council Directive 85/337/EEC of the 27th June, 1985 (O.J. No. L17, 5.7.85, p.40) on the same subject. The regulations amend Article 67 of the Roads (Northern Ireland) Order 1993 and require the Department to determine the need to carry out an environmental assessment in respect of projects falling within Annex II of the amended Directive in accordance with a case-by-case examination or thresholds or criteria set by it taking account in any event of the relevant criteria set out in Annex III of the amended Directive. It is also required to publish its determination. The Department must include in its environmental statement an outline of the main alternatives studied by it and an indication of the main reason for its choice, taking into account the environmental effects. It shall publish the environmental statement within a reasonable time to ensure that the public concerned is given an opportunity to express an opinion before it publishes its decision as to whether to initiate the project. The regulations provide for consultation between Member States in cases where the project is likely to have a significant effect on the environment in other Member States.

The regulations make consequential amendments to Article 133 of the Order and revoke the Roads (Assessment of Environmental Effects) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1994.

PARKING PLACES FOR DISABLED PERSONS' VEHICLES
