MARKETING OF EGGS.

DETERMINATION OF WHOLESALE
DEALERS' PRICES.

ORDER DATED THE TWENTY-FIFTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1938, MADE BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE UNDER SECTION ONE OF THE MARKETING OF EGGS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1936.

The Ministry of Agriculture, in exercise of the powers conferred on it by section one of the Marketing of Eggs Act (Northern Ireland), 1936, and of every other power enabling it in that behalf and in accordance with advice given by the Egg Marketing Committee for Northern Ireland hereby determines as follows, that is to say:—

1. The prices payable by licensed wholesale dealers for eggs delivered during the week ending Saturday, 26th February, 1938, shall be as follows:—

HEN EGGS.

(a) (i) For hen eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer from a producer where the eggs were produced by the producer's own hens, 7½d. per lb.:

Provided that where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading and packing of eggs, or to the premises set forth in the Schedule to this Order, an additional half-penny per lb. shall be paid;

(ii) For hen eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A from a licensed wholesale dealer of Class B, 7 11-16d. per lb.:

Provided that where the licensed wholesale dealer of Class B had accepted delivery of the eggs during the week ended 19th February, 1938, the price payable to him for such eggs by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A shall be 9 3-16d. per lb.

DUCK EGGS.

(b) For duck eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer from a producer where the eggs were produced by the producer's own ducks 1/1 per dozen:

Provided that where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading and packing of eggs, or to the premises set forth in the Schedule to this Order, an additional three-farthings shall be paid for each complete dozen so delivered.

2. This Order may be cited as the Marketing of Eggs (Determination of Wholesale Dealers' Prices) (No. 8) Order (Northern Ireland), 1938, and shall be construed as one with the Marketing of Eggs (Determination of Wholesale Dealers' Prices) Order (Northern Ireland), 1937.

HERRING INDUSTRY ACT, 1935.

The following Report has been made by the Herring Industry Board, pursuant to Section 1 (6) of the Act, as to the practicability of making provision for electing members of the Board by persons engaged in the herring industry.

1. Under the provision of the above subsection it is the duty of the Board as soon

as may be after 15th March, 1937, to consider "whether it is practicable to make provision for the election by persons engaged in the Herring Industry of the members of the Board having special knowledge of the industry" and thereafter to report or submit a scheme as the case may be.

2. The Board have reconsidered this question on the basis of the legal opinion communicated to them that the words "whether it is practicable to make provision for the election by persons engaged in the herring industry of the members of the Board who are required to have special knowledge of the industry" should be interpreted as meaning whether it is possible to devise workable machinery for the election of such members by persons engaged in the industry on a fair basis of representation of such persons and that the matter should be considered without regard to the probable suitability or otherwise of the persons likely to be elected for the performance of the statutory duties entrusted to the Board.

3. There would be no great difficulty in devising a workable scheme of election by the Board's licensees only and so following the practice of the various marketing Boards whereby the election of the members of those Boards is confined to registered persons, but it may be doubted whether such a scheme, which would vest the voting power in a comparatively small proportion of the persons engaged in the herring industry, can be regarded as an adequate compliance with the terms of the Statute.

4. If it is essential in order to comply with the terms of the Statute to extend the basis of election beyond the Board's licensees the difficulties in the way of devising a scheme which would give a fair and equitable basis of representation of persons engaged in the industry seem to be almost insuperable.

5. On the catching side of the industry alone certainly ten to twelve thousand, and possibly as much as fifteen thousand, persons find employment to a greater or lesser degree. These people are so employed for periods varying from one or two days to ten or eleven months of the year; their vessels range from small boats to steam drifters and steam trawlers, and the amounts they catch vary from a few stone to many tons per man.

The fishermen in all classes of vessels may be owners of ships and nets, persons remunerated by share of the catch or mere paid servants, and a great many of them are employed for longer periods in other industries, such as the mercantile marine, trawling for white fish, agriculture and public works, than in herring fishing. There are at least 160 ports and places of all sizes and importance where herring are landed.

6. It would clearly be inequitable to place all these persons in an equal position

as regards voting strength and so give to a man whose property and livelihood depend entirely upon herring fishing no more voting strength than another to whom herring fishing is a mere casual side-line, but it seems impossible to find a fair basis of discrimination or, if one could be found, to apply it.

7. The Board know the names and owners of such vessels as are licensed by them, but otherwise have no knowledge or means of obtaining knowledge of the names of the other vessels used in herring catching, the periods for which they are so used, the identity and status of their crews, or the amounts of their catches, and any attempt to obtain this information would be exceedingly costly and would probably involve the Board in a recurrent expenditure outside all proportion to their financial resources.

8. The matter is further complicated by the question whether a person who has for the time being left the herring industry and joined another trade can be regarded as being a person engaged in the herring industry and so qualified to vote. If the word "engaged" means engaged for the time being, probably three-quarters of the persons who catch herrings would be disqualified from voting in an election taking place in the first four months of the year.

9. In view of the above considerations, and on the assumption that election by licensees would not satisfy the requirements of the section, the Board are of opinion that it is not practicable to make provision for the election by persons engaged in the herring industry of the members of the Board who are required to be persons having special knowledge of the industry.
