A PROCLAMATION

FOR APPOINTING WEDNESDAY, JULY 12th, 1939, A BANK HOLIDAY AND A PUBLIC HOLIDAY IN NORTHERN IRELAND.

I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, the Holidays Extension Act, 1875, and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, and of every power me thereunto enabling, do hereby appoint Wednesday, the Twelfth day of July next, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and as a Public Holiday in Northern Ireland, under and in accordance with the said Acts, and I do by this Proclamation command the said day to be so observed, and all loving subjects of His Majesty to order themselves accordingly.

Given at Government House, Hillsborough, this twenty-sixth day of May, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine.

SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES ACT,
1921.

AMENDMENT OF LISTS OF ARTICLES
CHARGEABLE WITH DUTY UNDER PART I.
(Safeguarding of Key Industries).

1. Section 1 (5) of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, provides that for the purpose of preventing disputes arising as to whether any goods are or are not chargeable with duty under Part I of the Act, the Board of Trade may from time to time issue lists defining the articles which are to be taken as falling under any of the general descriptions set out in the Schedule to the Act, and where any list is so issued defining the articles which are to be taken as falling under such general description, the said Schedule shall have effect as if the articles comprised in the lists were therein substituted for that general description.

2. Section 5 (3) of the Finance Act, 1936, provides, amongst other things, that the power of the Board of Trade under sub-section (5) of Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, to issue lists defining articles which are to be taken as falling under any of the general descriptions set out in the Schedule to that Act shall include power to amend any list so issued.

3. The Board of Trade hereby amend List H issued in 1921 by adding the words "of a purity not less than 95 per cent. excluding moisture" to the items silver chloride and silver sulphide.

4. This amendment shall take effect as from the 30th May, 1939.

MARKETING OF EGGS (DETERMINATION OF WHOLESALE DEALERS' PRICES) (No. 21) ORDER (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1939.

Notice is hereby given that an Order has been made by the Ministry of Agriculture determining that the prices payable by licensed wholesale dealers for eggs delivered during the week ended Saturday, 27th May, 1939, shall be as follows:—

(a) (i) For hen eggs purchased from a producer 5½d. per lb.

Where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading, and packing of eggs, or to a collecting depot specified in the schedule to the above-mentioned Order, an additional halfpenny per lb. shall be paid.

(ii) For hen eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A from a licensed wholesale dealer of Class B, 63-16d. per lb.

Deductions:—Seconds ¼d per egg;
Rejects ¾d. per egg.

(b) For duck eggs purchased from a producer 8d per dozen.

Where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading, and packing of eggs, or to a collecting depot specified in the schedule to the above-mentioned Order, an additional three-farthings shall be paid for each complete dozen so delivered.

Deductions:—Rejects ¾d. per egg.
