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STATUTORY RULES AND ORDERS,

ANIMAL, NORTHERN IRELAND.  
Diseases of Animals.

THE ANIMALS (QUARANTINE) ORDER (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1923, DATED APRIL 20, 1923, MADE BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE HOME DEPARTMENT, UNDER THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1894 TO 1914.

By virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in me under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, as amended and adapted by any subsequent enactments, and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, I hereby order as follows:—

1. Animals may, notwithstanding the provisions of any Order prohibiting the import of animals from Great Britain to Northern Ireland, be landed at or moved into the Quarantine Station defined in the Schedule to this Order, if intended for the maintenance or improvement of any breed of livestock in Northern Ireland, or for other special purposes, provided that the proposed landing in each case has been approved by the Department.

2. The landing of an animal at, and the movement of an animal into the Quarantine Station is hereby made subject to the following conditions:—

(i) The animal must be accompanied by a permit, issued by the Department, authorising it to be landed at or moved into the Quarantine Station, and the issue of such a permit may be made subject to such conditions as in each case the Department may consider necessary, including, in case the animal is six months old or upwards, the production of a certificate of a duly qualified veterinary practitioner that the animal has been shown by the tuberculin test within such period prior to its landing or movement, as the Department may specify, to be free of tuberculosis.

(ii) The animal when imported from Great Britain must be accompanied by a certificate of an authorised officer of the Railway Company, by which the animal was taken on rail in Great Britain, that the railway vehicle in which the animal was carried had been thoroughly cleaned and disinfected in the manner required by the Regulations of the Ministry of Agriculture in that behalf, before the animal was placed therein, and that during the transit of the said animal in the said railway vehicle no animal or animals save and except an animal or animals intended for importation to Northern Ireland, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, was or were carried or placed in the said railway vehicle.

3. An animal in respect of which a permit has been granted shall be conveyed only on a vessel approved by the Department for the purpose of the conveyance of animals to the Quarantine Station, and subject to such conditions as may be indicated to the owner or master of the vessel from time to time.

4. If an animal so conveyed dies or is slaughtered on board the vessel (or before its examination), the carcase shall not be removed from the ship, but shall be brought to

the landing place of the Quarantine Station, from which it shall not be removed without, and where it shall be dealt with according to, the directions of a Veterinary Inspector.

5. No animal shall be landed at the Quarantine Station except after inspection by, and under the supervision of a Veterinary Inspector.

6. All dung of animals that have been or are intended to be landed at the Quarantine Station, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about such animals, and all other dung, fodder, litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as a Veterinary Inspector may direct.

7. The provisions of paragraph 18 of the Animals (Transit and General) (Ireland) Order of 1913 shall apply and are hereby applied to any ship, lighter, float or other vessel or vehicle that may be employed in the conveyance of animals to the Quarantine Station.

8. The animal when landed shall be detained in the Quarantine Station for such period or periods as may from time to time be directed in each case by the Department. Whilst detained in the said Quarantine Station the animals shall be under the supervision of a Veterinary Inspector. During such period of detention the animals and the Quarantine Station shall be subject to such directions as may be given by or on behalf of the Department for the purpose of preventing the spread of disease.

9. If any animal in course of transit to, or in the Quarantine Station, gives birth to any young, the provisions of this Order and any rules made or directions given hereunder, so far as they relate to such animal, shall, so far as they may be applicable, apply to such young in the same manner in which they apply to the said animal.

10. If a Veterinary Inspector of the Department is of opinion that an animal in the Quarantine Station is mortally injured, or so severely injured, or so diseased, or in such physical condition that it is cruel to keep it alive, he may require the person in charge of the animal to slaughter it forthwith with such instruments or appliances and with such precautions and in such manner as to inflict as little suffering as practicable, and if the person so required shall refuse or neglect to do so, or if there is no person in charge present in the Quarantine Station, the Inspector may cause the animal to be slaughtered.

11. In the event of cattle plague, contagious pleuro-pneumonia, anthrax, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, swine fever or other contagious disease being found to exist during the period of detention in any animal landed under this Order, the Department may cause to be slaughtered all the animals in the consignment, and in the event of any such disease being suspected to exist in any animal so landed, the Department may cause the slaughter of such of the animals as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of diagnosis.

12. When moved out of the Quarantine Station every animal shall be accompanied by—

(a) a certificate of a Veterinary Inspector, certifying that it is free from disease; and  
 (b) a licence of a Veterinary Inspector, specifying the place of destination to which and the person to whom it is to be taken.

A Veterinary Inspector may, in accordance with instructions given by the Department, impose any conditions as to the subsequent movement of the animal or otherwise, and any such conditions shall be specified in the licence.

#### USE AND CONTROL OF QUARANTINE STATION.

13. (1) No animals other than those entering the Quarantine Station under the conditions of permits issued by the Department shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in the Station, and the animals landed under this Order shall be kept separate from all other animals.

(2) The Quarantine Station shall not be used for any purpose other than the purposes of this Order.

14. (1) A Veterinary Inspector or the Superintendent of the Station is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof, or of any building therein, a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission or without fulfilling and observing the requirements and conditions mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person who enters or goes into, on, or over such premises without that permission, or who fails to fulfil or observe those requirements and conditions shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) A Veterinary Inspector or the Superintendent of the Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit the Station, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person who fails to quit such premises on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

15. A Veterinary Inspector or the Superintendent of the Quarantine Station is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering or leaving such Station will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes in the manner specified in such notice, and thereupon every person shall before entering or leaving the Station, as the case may be, disinfect himself and his clothes accordingly.

16. All manures, washings, and scrapings shall be placed in a suitable receptacle and thoroughly mixed with quicklime, and no manure, washings, or scrapings shall be removed from the Quarantine Station without a permit from an authorised Inspector, and unless disinfected to the satisfaction of such Authorised Inspector.

17. The Department, through a Veterinary Inspector, may "for the purpose of preventing infection" give directions as to the sources from which the foodstuffs to be consumed in the Quarantine Station may be obtained, and as to the time at which such foods may be conveyed into the Station.

18. (1) No carcass shall be removed from the Quarantine Station, except with the permission of a Veterinary Inspector.

(2) If a Veterinary Inspector is of opinion that any carcass in the Quarantine Station may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Department.

#### OFFENCES.

19. (1) If any animal, or any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other thing shall be landed or moved, or in case any attempt to land or move any animal, or any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other things be made in contravention of this Order, or in contravention of any rules or regulations made hereunder or in contravention of the terms or requirements of any licence, notice, or directions issued hereunder, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place where or from which such animal, dung, or other thing is landed or moved, and the person causing, directing, permitting or attempting to make or cause to be made the landing or movement, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

20. The Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspectors of the Department to carry into effect and enforce this Order, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

21. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires, "The Department" means the Department of the Imperial Secretary to the Governor of Northern Ireland.

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894. "A Veterinary Inspector" means a Veterinary Inspector in the regular employment of the Department of the Imperial Secretary to the Governor of Northern Ireland. "Animals" means cattle, sheep and goats, and all other ruminating animals and swine. "Disease" means cattle plague (that is to say, rinder-pest, or the disease commonly called cattle-plague), contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, or swine-fever (that is to say, the disease known as typhoid fever of swine, soldier, purple, red disease, hog cholera, or swine plague). "Carcass" means the carcass of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of a carcass, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof. "Fodder" means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals.

“Litter” means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals. “Master” includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel. Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.
