BY THE KING—A PROCLAMATION,

For encouraging Seamen and Landinen to enter themfelves on board his Majefty's ships of war.

GEORGE R.

Whereas it is our royal intention to give all due encouragement to all fuch seamen and landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in our service; we have thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Countil, to publish this our Royal Proclamation; and we do hereby promise and declare, that all such able seamen, not above the age of 50, nor under the age of 20 years, see for our service, who shall, on or before the 30th day April next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of our ships, or officers employed in tenders, or at rendeztous on thore for raising men for the service of our navy, shall receive, as our Royal bounty, the sum of 31 each man; and all such ordinary seamen, fit for our service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the sum of 21 each man; and all such able-bodied landmen, not above the age of 35, nor under the age of 20 years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the sum of 20s. each man, as our royal bounty; such respective sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the ports or places where the ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the third muster of such seamen and landmen.

And we do declare, that the qualifications of the seamen and landmen.

And we do declare that the qualifications of the seamen and landmen so entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the ship or vessel where they shall enter. And for preventing any abuses by any persons leaving the vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on board any other our ships or vessels, in order to obtain the said bounty-money; we do hereby declare and command, that such seamen and landmen belonging to any of our ships or vessels as shall absent themselves from any of the said ships or vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter

themselves on board any other of our said ships or vessels, in order to obtain the said bounty, shall not only lose the wages due to them in the said ships or vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their

demerits.

BY THE KING—A. PROCLAMATION,

For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from ferving Foreign Princes and States; and for granting rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

Whereas we are informed, that great numbers of mariners and seafaring men, our natural born subjects, are in the service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the prejudice of our kingdom; we have thought it necessary, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all masters of ships, pilots, mariners, seamen, shipwrights, and other seafaring men whatsoever and wheresoever (being our natural born subjects), who are in the pay or service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any foreign ship or vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden duty and allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such foreign services, and return home to their native countries: And surfaces, and return home to their native countries: And surfaces of ships, pilots, mariners, seamen, shipwrights, and other seafaring men, whatsoever (being our natural born subjects), from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from hencesorth to forbear to enter themselves into the pay or service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any foreign ship or vessel lewhatsoever, without our special licence first had and obtained in that behalf; to all which we expect due obedience and exact consormity; and we do hereby publish and declare, that the offenders to the contrary shall not only incur our just displacator, but be proceeded against for their contempt according to the utmost several shall not only incur our just displacator, but be proceeded against for their contempt according to the utmost several shall not only incur our just displacator, but be proceeded against for their contempt according to the utmost several of 20s. for every able and ordinary seamen sit to serve on ho

cers and Commissioners of our navy, and at the outports by the naval officers (where there are any), and (where
there are no naval officers), by the Collectors of our Cuftoms, immediately upon a certificate being produced to
the faid principal Officers and Commissioners of our
navy, naval officers, or Collectors respectively, by the
person who may make discovery of any seaman or seamen as aforesaid, certifying his name, and the name or
names, and number of seamen procured in consequence
of his discovery; the said certificate to be given by such
officer as may take such seaman or seamen for our service.
