#### FOREIGN OFFICE, April 10, 1890.

Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has been informed by the French Ambassador at the Court of St. James', that with a view to prevent the importation of arms and munitions of war into the Kingdom of Dahomey, the Government of the Republic has determined to establish from the 4th of April a Blockade of the portion of the Slave Coast comprised between the limit of the French and German possessions of the Popos (6° 14′ 45″ of north latitude, and 0° 40′ 36″ of longitude west of Paris), and the eastern limit of the French possessions of Porto Novo, which, according to the arrangements between England and France of the 10th of August last, is fixed on the coast by the line of the meridian passing through Ajarra Creek.
