By the Board of Agriculture.

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 96 of The Animals Order of 1886, do hereby license the Local Authority for the County of Edinburgh to dig up or cause to be dug up, within fourteen days after the date of this Licence, the carcass of a certain head of cattle belonging to Robert George Wardlaw Ramsay, that was buried on or about the seventh day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety at

Thornton, Rosewell, Mid-Lothian, subject to the following conditions:—

1. When dug up, the Local Authority shall forthwith cause the carcase to be examined, with a view to ascertain whether the animal was affected with a contagious or infectious disease; and the Local Authority shall then cause the carcase to be re-buried as soon as possible, and shall cause it to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quicklime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.
2. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, examination, and re-burial of the carcase shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.
3. This Licence is revocable by the Board of Agriculture.
