ST JAMES'S—March 24, 1803.

The following address has been presented to the KING; which his MAJESTY was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING'S Most Excellent MAJESTY, The humble Address of the Noblemen, Freeholders, and Heritors of the County of Edinburgh.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your MAJESTY'S most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, and Heritors of the County of Edinburgh, beg leave to approach your Throne with our unfeigned congratulations on the providential discovery and defeat of the late traitorous conspiracy against your Royal Person and Government.

Deeply impressed with sentiments of affectionate regard to your MAJESTY for the blessings we enjoy under your mild and equitable Government, and sensible of the invaluable benefits we derive from our excellent Constitution, we beheld with horror and detestation the base and nefarious plan for involving in one common destruction the objects of our dearest interest, the life of our Gracious Sovereign, and the stability of our Constitution.

Anxious for the welfare and security of our country, which is most closely connected with your MAJESTY'S personal safety, we avail ourselves of this opportunity of renewing our expressions of sincere attachment and ardent affection to your MAJESTY'S person; and we hope that the people of these realms, living under your MAJESTY'S parental care, may long possess the comforts and blessings they have hitherto enjoyed.
