LOCAL GOVERNMENT (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1889.

THE BOUNDARY COMMISSIONERS
FOR SCOTLAND.

COUNTY OF PERTH.

Parishes of Blackford and Glendevon.

WHEREAS a part of the Parish of Blackford, containing 450 acres or thereby, situated south of the River Devon and adjoining the Parishes of Tillicoultry, Dollar, and Glendevon, is, as shown on the Ordnance Survey Maps, detached or nearly detached from the main portion of the Parish of Blackford:

And whereas it appears to us, after communicating with the Authorities and others interested, to be expedient to deal with the said part in manner hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, we, the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, determine and order as follows:—

I. Subject to the provisions of the said Act, that portion of the Parish of Blackford which is bounded on the north by the *medium filum* of the River Devon, on the west by the Parish of Tillicoultry, on the south by the Parishes of Tillicoultry and Dollar, and on the east by the Parish of Glendevon, shall cease to be part of the Parish of Blackford, and shall form part of the Parish of Glendevon.

II. This Order shall come into operation on the 15th day of May 1891.
