RDERS for the Court's going into Mourning this day, for the late Admiral His Serene Highness The Prince Victor of Hohenlohe-Langenburg, G.C.B., Governor and Constable of the Castle of Windsor, Nephew to Her Majesty The Queen, viz.:—

The Ladies to wear black Dresses, white Gloves, black or white Shoes, Feathers, and Fans, Pearls, Diamonds, or plain gold or silver Ornaments.

The Gentlemen to wear black Court Dress, with black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Friday the 15th instant, viz.:—

The Ladies to wear black Dresses, with coloured Ribbons, Flowers, Feathers, and Ornaments, or grey or white Dresses, with black Ribbons, Flowers, Feathers, and Ornaments.

The Gentlemen to continue the same Mourning.

And on Friday, the 22nd instant, the Court to go out of Mourning.
