The gracious letter with which your Majesty hath honoured this meeting of the General Assembly of our national Church, we have received with the utmost respect and gratitude.
The re-appointment of Lord Napier to be your Majesty's High Commissioner, and to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly, we consider as a distinguished mark of your Majesty's gracious attention to our interest, and to our wishes. The proofs he has already given of zeal for your Majesty's service, affection for the Church of Scotiand, and firm attachment to the true interests of his country, make this your Majesty's choice highly acceptable to us.

We rely with equal graritude and confidence upon the declaration communicated to us by his Grace the Lord High Commissioner, that it is your Majesty's unalterable purpose and resolution to maintain the Church we represent in the full possession and enjoyment of all its rights and privileges, as by law established.

We intreat that we may be permitted to assure your Majesty, that the great importance of the objects of our deliberation shall excite in us the most zealous endeavours for their accomplishment. In the discharge of the facred duty with which we are invested, of watching over the religious and moral principles of the people, we have clearly seen that no nation can be happy or prosperous without virtue, nor virtuous without religion: Impressed with a due sense of this awful truth, and consequently aware of the great end to which our labours ought to be directed, we will apply ourselves to the discharge of the high trust reposed in us with vigour and sidelity. Our exertions shall be animated by the approbation which your Majesty is pleased to express of our past conduct; by the assurance that our success will give satisfaction to our Sovereign; and by the trust that we shall at all times receive his most ready and cordial support.

We entreat your Majesty to accept of our warmest

we entreat your Majesty to accept of our warmest and most humble acknowledgements for your attention to the advancement of religious knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland: Your royal donation for this purpose we shall endeavour to apply so as most effectually to promote the delign for which it is bestowed.

By the KING—A PROCLAMATION.

For increasing the Militia.

Whereas it is expedient that the number of our militia forces should be increased without delay: And whereas the occasion thereof high the communicated to Parliament; we have thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal proclamation; and we do hereby, in pursuance of the powers which are vested in us by an act passed in the forty-second year of our reign, entituled "An act for amending the laws relating to the militia in England, and for augmenting the militia," and of another act passed in the same year, entituled "An act to raise and establish a militia force in Scotland," order and direct that, in addition to the number of men already required to be raised under the faid acts by the several counties, ridings, sewarries, cities, and places therein mentioned, there shall forthwith be raised and enrolled in the said several counties, ridings, sewartries, cities, and places therein mentioned, respectively, such a number of men as may amount to, but not exceed the proportion of one-half of the whole number of men required to be raised by the said acts in each county, riding, thewartry, city, and place respectively; And we do hereby further order and direct our Lieutenants and Deputy Lieutenants respectively, of the said several counties, ridings, stewartries, cities, and places, immediately to assemble and forthwith proceed to apportion the number of men hereby required to be raised in their respective counties, ridings, stewartries, cities, and places among the several hundreds, rapes, lathes, wapentakes, or other divisions, and also among the several parishes, tythings, or places therein respectively, and thereaster to proceed to raise and inrol such men on or before the sixteenth day of July next ensuing.

Given at our Court at St James's, the twenty-fixth day of May, in the year of our lord one thousand eight hundred and three, in the forty-third year of our reign.
