John Malcolm M'Callum, Minister of the Parish of Muckairn, Argyllshire; Our trusty and well-beloved John Macleod, Esquire, Inverness; and Our trusty and well-beloved Henry Munro, Esquire, Inverness,—Greeting!

Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to inquire whether any, and if any, what land in the Counties of Argyll, Inverness, Ross and Cromarty, Sutherland, Caithness, and Orkney and Shetland, now occupied for the purposes of a deer forest, grouse moor, or other sporting purposes, or for grazing, not in the occupation of crofters or other small tenants, is capable of being cultivated to profit or otherwise advantageously occupied by crofters or other small tenants:

Now know ye that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge, discretion, and ability, have nominated, constituted, and appointed, and do by these presents nominate, constitute, and appoint you, the said David Brand, Michael Hugh Shaw-Stewart, Angus Sutherland, James Noel Muller Forsyth, George Gordon, John Malcolm M'Callum, John Macleod, and Henry Munro, to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry:

And for the better enabling you Our said Commissioners to make the said inquiry, We do by these presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to call before you, or any three or more of you, such persons as you may judge necessary, by whom you may be the better informed of the matters herein submitted for your consideration, and every matter connected therewith, and also to call for, have access

to, and examine all such books, documents, papers, or records as you shall judge likely to afford you the fullest information on the subject of this Our Commission; and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do further by these presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem expedient for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And Our further will and pleasure is that you, or any three or more of you, do with as little delay as possible report to Us under your hands and seals upon the matters referred to you as aforesaid, and that you may have power to certify to Us from time to time your several proceedings in respect of the matters aforesaid, if it may seem expedient to you so to do:

And We further will and command, and by these presents ordain, that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And for the purpose of aiding you in the execution of this Our Commission, We do hereby authorise and empower you to appoint a Secretary to this Our Commission:

And We ordain the said Letters Patent to be extended in the most ample form with all clauses needful, and to pass the Seal aforesaid, *per saltum*, without passing any other Seal or Register. For doing whereof this shall be to the Director of Our Chancery for writing the same, and to the Keeper of the said Seal for causing the same to be appended thereto a sufficient Warrant.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the 6th day of December 1892, in the fifty-sixth year of Our Reign.

THE MARKETS AND FAIRS (WEIGHING OF CATTLE) RETURNS (SCOTLAND) ORDER OF 1893.

By the Board of Agriculture.

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Markets and Fairs (Weighing of Cattle) Acts, 1887 and 1891, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The market authority of every market held in any of the places specified in the First Schedule to this Order (being the places mentioned in the Schedule to the Markets and Fairs (Weighing of Cattle) Act, 1891, as the places in Scotland from which returns are required to be made), and every auctioneer who sells cattle, sheep, or swine at any mart where cattle, sheep, or swine are habitually or periodically sold in any of the said specified places, shall send to the Board of Agriculture once in every week a return in the form specified in the Second Schedule to this Order and setting forth the particulars indicated in that form, so far as the market authority or the auctioneer, as the case may be, can ascertain the same, the number of cattle, sheep, and swine entering the market or mart, and the number and weight of cattle, sheep, and swine weighed at the market or mart during the seven days next before the date of the sending in of the return, and the price of the cattle, sheep, and swine sold during those seven days at the market or mart.

2. This Order may be cited as THE MARKETS AND FAIRS (WEIGHING OF CATTLE) RETURNS (SCOTLAND) ORDER OF 1893.

3. This Order shall commence and come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

In witness whereof the Board of Agriculture have hereunto set their Official Seal this thirteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

To all the Local Authorities in Scotland within whose District there is a Port or Harbour.

WHEREAS We, the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor and for Public Health in Scotland, on the 15th July 1892, made Directions and Regulations prescribing that, from and after the date thereof, and until we should otherwise direct, no rags from France, or from any Port on the Black Sea or Sea of Azov, whether in Russia, Roumania, Bulgaria, or Turkey, or from any other Port of Turkey in Asia, should be delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, nor landed in any Port or Place in Scotland:

And whereas on the 15th day of August 1892, We made Directions and Regulations prescribing that, from and after the 19th day of August 1892, and until We should by Order otherwise direct, no rags, bedding, or disused or filthy clothing, whether belonging to emigrants or otherwise from any Foreign Port in Europe north of Dunkirk, other than Ports of Norway, Sweden, and Denmark, should be delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, nor landed in any Port or Place in Scotland:

And whereas it is expedient that such Directions and Regulations should be amended as hereinafter mentioned:

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs have signified their consent to the Regulations herein contained, so far as the same apply to the Officers of Customs:

Now, therefore, We, the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor and of Public Health in Scotland, by virtue of the powers conferred on us by Part III. of the Public Health Act aforesaid, do hereby issue the following Directions and Regulations, to extend to all places in Scotland, and to all Ports and Arms of the Sea lying within the jurisdiction of the Admiralty, and adjacent to such places:—

ARTICLE 1.—In each of the above-cited Directions and Regulations the term 'Rags' shall mean only such rags, of whatever material, within the meaning of the term 'Rags' as used in the Official Customs' Import List as—

- (1) are dirty, or mixed with dust, or
- (2) are articles of clothing or bedding, or have formed part of any article of clothing or bedding and have not been re-manufactured or partly re-manufactured, or
- (3) are packed with any rags included in (1) or (2).

ARTICLE 2.—In Article 2 of the above-cited Directions and Regulations, dated the Fifteenth

day of August One thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the word 'dirty' shall be inserted before the word 'bedding,' so that, subject to the provisions hereof, the said Article shall provide that, until We shall otherwise direct, no rags, dirty bedding, or disused or filthy clothing, whether belonging to emigrants or otherwise, from any foreign Port in Europe north of Dunkirk, other than Ports of Norway, Sweden, and Denmark, shall be delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, nor landed in any Port or Place in Scotland.

ARTICLE 3.—Each of the above cited Directions and Regulations shall be amended so that—

- (a) Rags, bedding, or clothing, prohibited by any of the said Directions and Regulations from being either delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, or landed, may be delivered overside or landed for the purpose of disinfection.
- (b) Any such rags, bedding, or clothing delivered overside or landed for the purpose of disinfection shall not be taken out of the custody of the Officers of Customs until the same shall have been disinfected by and at the cost of the consignee or other person having control over the same, by means of steam under pressure in such manner as to secure the exposure of every part of the bale, package, or parcel, or of every article, to a temperature of not less than 212° Fahrenheit, nor until the Medical Officer shall have given a Certificate to an Officer of Customs as to such disinfection, which Certificate shall be in the following form:—

PORT OF.....

'I hereby certify that the [rags, or bedding, or clothing] delivered overside or landed at this Port from the ship [name of ship] of or from [port of sailing], and consigned to , and distinguished by the following marks or numbers , have been disinfected at this Port in accordance with the provisions of Article 3 of the Directions and Regulations of the Board of Supervision, dated the 16th December 1892.

'(Signed).....Medical Officer of Health.

'Date.....1892.'

ARTICLE 4.—Any expenses incurred by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs in watching goods delivered overside or landed for the purpose of disinfection under these Directions and Regulations, shall be defrayed by the consignee or other person having control over the same.

ARTICLE 5.—If any such rags, bedding, or clothing so delivered overside or landed for the purpose of disinfection shall not, within seventy-two hours after being so delivered or landed, be disinfected and certified as aforesaid, they shall be destroyed in manner provided by Article 3 of the above-cited Directions and Regulations.

ARTICLE 6.—These Directions and Regulations shall be read as one with each of the above-cited Directions and Regulations, and words herein shall, subject to Article 1 hereof, have the same

meaning as words in those Directions and Regulations.
