SIR,

TRANSMIT, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a letter from CAPT. MAITLAND, of his MAJESTY's ship Loire, giving an account of the success which has attended an enterprise he fent the boats of that thip on, under the orders of LIEUTENANTS TEMPLE and Bowen. The good conduct and intrepidity of the officers and men employed on that fervice make it unnecessary for me to add any comment, perfuaded that it cannot be lost fight of by their Lordships. i. Loire, off L' Ille de Bas, June 28, 1803. SIR,

I have the pleasure of informing you, that, last night, three of the boats of his Majes-TEMPLE and Bowen, in a most gallant manner boarded, and, after a severe conflict of nearly ten minutes on her deck, carried the national brig Venteux, bearing four long eighteen pounders, and fix thirty, fix pound brais carronades, commanded by Mons. Montfort, Lieut. DE VIISSEAU, lying close under the batteries of the Iffe of Bas.

When it is confidered that the Venteux, perfeelly prepared; manned with eighty two men, all of whom were upon deck, and covered with heavy batteries, was opposed to the crews of two o. our boats, (as the third, from rowing heavy, did not get up till the brig was completely gain-ed possession of) I feel consident that you will view et in the light that I do, as one of those brilliant.

exploits which add lustre to the British arms, of captured a small French privateer of twenty-four which, though fo many instances occurred during the late war, no one has before been happy enough to have thrown in his way during the present.

The success of Mr. TEMPLE's daring attempt speaks sufficiently for his conduct, and that of every one under his command, to render it superfluous for me to enter into any eulogium on the present occasion.
