The following Address having been presented to the King, his Majesty was pleased to receive it very graciously:

To the KING.

Most Gracious Sovereiga,
We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loval subjects the General Convention of the Noyal Burghs of Scotland, aliemt led in their annual Meeting according to the ancient statutes of this realm, humbly approach the throne, to review, in the name of our Constituents, the most scheme assumes of their firm allegiance to your Majesty's Person and Government, and of their inviolable attachment to the liberties and constitution of their country.

The spirit of encroachment and insolence manifested by the Governors of France during the short interval of peace, their undifguised violation of the rights of independent States, their daring attempts to dishonour this nation, by limiting the exercise of its freedom and hispitality; their contemptuous neglect of the remonstrances made against the injustice practised on your Majesty's subjects; their jastice practifed on your Majesty's subjects; their avowed hostility to the general commerce and proavowen northly to the general commerce and pro-fperity of your king loms, and their infulting hoaft, that, in a contest with France, Britons are unequal to their own detence; these repeated acts of pro-vocation and aggression have demonstrated that, on their part, the processing only a described trans-

to their own detence; these repeated acts of provocation and aggression have demonstrated that, on their part, the peace was only a deceitful truce, and have roused through every corner of this land the most determined resolution to becline no facrifices which your Majesty may deem necessary for maintaining the dignity and independence of your Crown. In this patrioric resolution the Convention of the Royal Burghs of your ancient Kingdom of Scotland most cordially participate.

As guardians, in this part of the Empire, of that great lyssem of commerce and manus tures, which has raised Britain to her present envied pre-eminence, and contributed so essentially to the convenience and improvement of the civilized world, we must be peculiarly sensible to the evils of a wardire excellence and improvement of the civil prosperity. But we have learned that partial and temporary evils must be borne for the take of universal and permanent good. We have calculated the dangers of the awful struggle in which your Majesty has been compelled to engage; and we foreste the loss and embarrassiment which in

may occasion to ourselves, as well as the great expence of treasure and blood which it may cost the nation. But we seel that the glory, the happiness, and even the existence of our country are now at stake; we see around us the wrecks of nations whome a short-sighted selfishness with-held from making the requisite exertions in due time; and we are deeply convinced that no danger can be equal to that of subjection to a foreign power, and no loss so irreparable as the loss of national honour and independence.

Animated by these sentiments, the Convention of the R yal Burg's feel themselves called on to ratify, in its full extent, the plesse of support given to your Majesty by our Representatives in Parliament; and we are ready to stand forth with our lives and fortunes in the public cause. The power and resources of this country, under your Majesty's usspicious Government, have reached a height unknown in the annals of our history. We are confident that, in the present eventsu criffs, your Majesty will employ them with energy and vigour; and we trust that, through the bleffing of Heaven on the wisdom of your Counsels, and the justice of your cause, they will enable your Majesty to repet the attarks of the enemy, to preserve the invaluable bleffings of our free Constitution, to protect and extend the means of commercial enterprize to your subjects, and to surnish to many other nations of Europe, our ancient friends and allies, an opportunity of recovering their former dignity.
