A dispatch of which the following is a copy, has been this day received from Lieutenant-General Grinfield, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's troops in the Windward and Leeward Charibbee islands, by the Right Hon. Lord Hobart, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department :

My Lord, St Lucia, June 22. 1803.

It is with fatisfaction I have the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that this day the fortress of Morne Fortunee was carried by assault, and the island of St Lucia is in consequence unconditionally restored to the British Government.

I have to state to your Lordship, that in consequence of his Majesty's order, fignified to me in your letter, dated the 16th of May, and received on the 14th inst. which I immediately communicated to Commodore Hood, he arrived at Barbadoes on the 17th; the troops, stores, &c. were on board, or embarked on the 19th; failed on the 20th. On the 21st, at day break, they were off the north end of St Lucia, in the course of the day the greatest part of the troops were disembarked in Choque Bay; about half past five, the out posts of the enemy were driven in, the town of Castries taken, and a summons was sent to the com mander of the troops of the French Re-

In consequence of the refusal of Brigade General Nogues to accede to any terms,

done accordingly at four o'clock, and it was carried in about half an hour, and with less loss; confidering the refistance, than could have been expected; but the loss has been chiefly among the higher ranks of officers, and those the nost truly valuable : but it is yet to be hoped most of them will recover, for the real benefit of his Majesty's fervice

I cannot omit a circumstance which reflects fo much credit, as well on the British nation, as on the conduct of the foldiers actually employed, that, notwithstanding the severe and spirited resistance of the French troops, yet, no fooner were the works carried by affault, and the opposition no longer existed, than every idea of animosity appeared to cease, and not a French foldier was either killed or wounded.

The return of the killed and wounded is herewith inclosed, which, excepting the number of officers of high rank, is not equal to what might have been expected, and, by far, less than it would have been, in all probability, had a formal investment of the for-

tress taken place. These dispatches will be delivered to your Lordship by my aid-du-camp Captain Weir, to whom I beg to refer your Lordship, for any information you may require. ADMIRALTY OFFICE, JULY 30. 1803. Copy of a Letter from Commodore Hood, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bast. dated on board the Centaur, in Shee Bay, St Lucia, 22d June 1803.

SIR,-I have the honour to acquaint you, for the information of the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, that on my arrival at Barbadoes on the 17th, late in the evening, having consulted Lieut. General Grinfield with respect to the intended cooperations of the army and navy, I instantly took measures to prevent further supplies being thrown into St Lucia (the ships, on General Nogues to accede to any terms, and the expectation of approaching rains, it became necessary to get possession of the Morne with as little deiny as possible. It was therefore determined, this morning, to natack the fortress by affault, which was file missing.
