The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Secretary for Scotland has, under the provisions of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, made a Representation stating that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor by the Sheriff-Substitute at Paisley, finding that the old and the new burying grounds at Lochwinnoch are dangerous to health and contrary to decency :

And whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that burials be discontinued in the said old burying ground, and from and after the 1st day of January 1895 in the said new burying ground, except in the vault belonging to the family of Mr. M'Dowall, of Garthland, in the old burying ground, and in the vault belonging to the family of the late Mr. Fyfe Jamieson in the new burying ground.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fourteenth day of June 1894.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order, or notice thereof, be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies of this Order or notice thereof, be affixed, as required by the above-mentioned Act, on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before such Representation is so considered.
