The following Address was received by the Queen on Her Majesty's Visit to Richmond, in the county of Surrey, on the occasion of the Baptism, at White Lodge, Richmond Park, on the 16th instant, of His Royal Highness Prince Edward Albert Christian George Andrew Patrick David, Great Grandson of the Queen, and Son of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York :—

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the Royal Borough of Richmond (Surrey), in Council assembled, desire to approach Your Most Gracious Majesty, and whilst assuring Your Majesty of their continued loyalty and sincere affection for Your Majesty and the other Members of the Royal House, desire most respectfully to testify to Your Majesty the deep satisfaction with which they have received the gratifying announcement of the birth of the Prince, the Son and Heir of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, at White Lodge, Richmond Park, on the 23rd June 1894, and they sincerely pray that Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York may speedily be restored to convalescence, and that health and happiness may continue to attend Your Majesty, His Royal Highness, and his illustrious Consort and Child.

To which Her Majesty gave the following Most Gracious Answer :—

‘I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address, and for your Congratulations on the Birth of My Great Grandson, Son of My dear Grandson, The Duke of York, whose christening is now about to take place.

Whereas, by the first section of 'The Colonial Probates Act, 1892,' it is enacted as follows:—

'Her Majesty the Queen may, on being satisfied that the legislature of any British possession has made adequate provision for the recognition in that possession of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom, direct by Order in Council that this Act shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications specified in the Order, apply to that possession, and thereupon, while the Order is in force, this Act shall apply accordingly.'

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Legislature of the British Possession hereinafter mentioned has made adequate provision for the recognition in that Possession of probates and letters of administration granted by the Courts of the United Kingdom.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

'The Colonial Probate Act, 1892,' shall apply to the British Possession hereunder mentioned:—

The Island of Jamaica.

CHARGES FOR MERCHANDISE TRAFFIC.

CALEDONIAN CANAL COMMISSIONERS.
(CALEDONIAN AND CRINAN CANALS.)

NOTICE is hereby given that, pursuant to the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1888, the Commissioners have submitted to the Board of Trade a proposed Revised Classification of Merchandise Traffic and Revised Schedule of Maximum Rates and Charges applicable thereto, proposed to be charged by the Commissioners in respect of these Canals; and that in such proposed classification and schedule there are stated the nature and amounts of all terminal charges proposed to be charged in respect of each class of traffic, and the circumstances under which the terminal charges are proposed to be made.

Every objector must, at the same time, transmit to the Secretary of the Commissioners, at his Office, House of Commons, London, a copy of the notice of objection, otherwise the objection will be liable to be dismissed without being heard. Due notice will be given of the time appointed for hearing and disposing of notices of objection.
