THE Queen has been pleased, by Warrant under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, to appoint Thomas Alexander Fyfe, Esquire, to the Office of Sheriff-Substitute of the Sheriffdom of Lanarkshire at Lanark.

DOWNING STREET, October 12, 1895.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Lord Lamington to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Queensland and its Dependencies.

WHITEHALL, October 15, 1895

The Queen has been pleased, by a Congé d'Élire under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, dated 21st September 1895, to empower the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Rochester to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Randall Thomas Davidson, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Winchester; and Her Majesty has been pleased to recommend to

the said Dean and Chapter the Reverend Edward Stuart Talbot, D.D., Honorary Canon of the Cathedral Church of Ripon, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Rochester.

ST. JAMES' PALACE, October 7, 1895.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint the Reverend David Robertson, M.A., Rector of Hartlebury, Kidderminster, and Honorary Chaplain to Her Majesty, to be one of Her Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, in the room of the Reverend Edward Stuart Talbot, D.D., now Bishop of Rochester; and also to appoint the Reverend Archibald Boyd Carpenter, M.A. Rector of St. George's, Bloomsbury, to be one of Her Majesty's Honorary Chaplains.
