Copy of a letter from Sir James Saumarez, K. B. Rear-Admiral of the Blue, &c. to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated at Guernfey the 19th instant.

SIR,

I beg you will please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, having detached his Majesty's ship Poulette, on the breaking up of the late gales of wind, to watch the enemy's armaments on the French coast, and to reconnoitre the port of Cherbourg, Capt. Dunbar had the good fortune to fall in with a French convoy of about thirty fail, escorted by a national brig and other armed vessels, standing to the castward, the whole of which were driven on the callward, the whole of which were driven on the rocks of Cape La Hagne; three of them were cut out by the boats of the Poulette, affilted by the Liberty brig, under a fmart fire from the

I herewith inclose Captain Dunbar's letter, and cannot too highly commend the zeal and good conduct diplayed by him, his officers, and men, on this fervice, which has been effected without the loss of a fingle man.

His Majesty's ship Poulette, at sea, November 15. 1803.

As I was passing the island of Alderney this morning, about a quarter past eleven, I came up with a convoy belonging to the enemy, confift-ing of about thirty fail, fleering to the eastward, efforted by feveral armed vessels, and in the act of rounding Cape La Hague.

I have great pleasure in acquainting you, that the attack made on them by his Majesty's ship under my command was such, as to compel their crews to run them on the rocks, where they became completely exposed to our shot, as well as

the dangers incident to that lituation. It is impossible for me to describe sufficiently the zeal and good conduct of those under me : Every officer and man volunteered their services in the boats, by which a brig, a lugger, and a floop, the latter made fast with her cable to the shore, were cut out under a smart fire, while the ship was carried, and anchored within three cables length of the furf, to cover those engaged on this enterprise. As the rest were lest dry by the tide, I am consident that several are totally loss.—Those that sell into our hands are new; and, from having sweeps on board, though not armed, evidently intended to aid the invasion. The Liberty took ashore, but the Moucheron could not get up in time. I am most happy to add, that not a man was hurt, and the loss of an anchor is all that we experienced.
