Never in the world's history has human progress during a period of sixty years been comparable with that of the time over which Your Majesty's reign has extended. In art, in science, in the applications of knowledge in every department of human thought and action to the needs and comforts of man, in the direction of political government to the improvement of the conditions of society, in the diffusion of education and in the opportunities which it affords to the humblest equally with the highest of your subjects, to take the place for which they are fitted by character, culture, and ability, the Victorian Age eclipses that of Augustus and Elizabeth.

We thank God that he has spared Your Majesty to witness and largely to promote those great social, moral, intellectual, and physical developments, and we earnestly pray that you may be spared for many long years to extend still farther the beneficent influence of a reign which

is even now without parallel.
