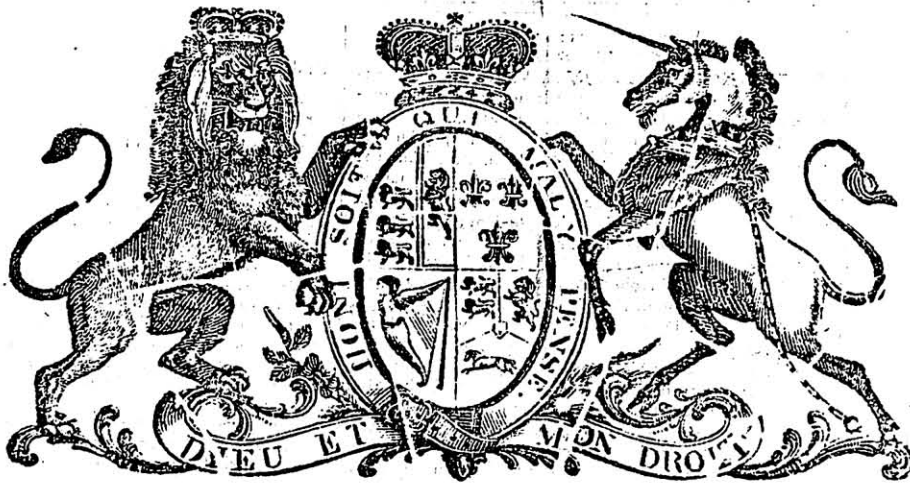

**ADMIRALTY-OFFICE—December 20. 1803.**

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Ruffel, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated at Yarmouth the 13th instant,

SIR,

I herewith transmit, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a copy of a letter which I have received from Lieutenant Brown, commanding his Majesty's gun-brig the Vixen, acquainting me with his having, on the 8th instant, captured the French lugger privateer Le Lionnais of Dunkirk.

*His Majesty's Gun brig Vixen, at sea, Dec. 29, 1803.*

SIR,

I beg to make known to you, that this day, at four P. M. Lowestoffe bearing N. W. distance eight leagues, his Majesty's gun-brig under my command, captured Le Lionnais, French cutter privateer, Jean Joley, commander of twenty-one tons burthen, mounting two carriage guns, with small arms, and a complement of twenty-one men, out four days, but had not made any captures

On removing the crew, I found the vessel in so bad a state, with every appearance of blowing weather, that I deemed it prudent to destroy her.

SIR,

I have the honour to acquaint you, that cruising off Capri, agreeable to my orders from Rear-Admiral Montagu, I this morning, at day-light, chased a lugger, and at noon came up with and captured the

French national gun-boat No. 436. mounting one brass eighteen pounder forward, and a howitzer abaft, commanded by Lewis Sautoin, Ensign de Vailléau, with seven sailors and a captain, and twenty-seven soldiers of the 36th regiment of the line. She failed the day before from Dunkirk for Boulogne,

APPOINTED BY ACT OF PARLIAMENT,  
Under the Convention with the United States of  
America.

THE BOARD having considered the arguments which have been urged in support of claims for compound interest, and interest at the rates established by law in the countries wherein the debts in question were contracted, not only before the period, when, if no such lawful impediment as are complained of, had been suffered to exist, it might reasonably be held that the said debts would respectively have been recovered, but for the time subsequent to that period.

Resolved.—That in estimating, under the Convention, the loss sustained by claimants within the description of the 6th Article of the Treaty of Amity, the Board will in no case allow compound interest for the time subsequent to the period when, if lawful impediments had not existed, it might reasonably be held that the said debts would respectively as above-mentioned have been recovered; and that they will not in any case allow any higher rate of interest for the time subsequent to that period, than the rate established by law in the country to which, from the residence of the creditor or other circumstances, it may appear that the amount of the debt, so recovered, would have been remitted—the terms of the agreement between the parties, whether expressed by special contract, or implied from the established usage of trade, being the rule to be observed in the allowance of interest, for the time (whether of War or Peace) preceding the period above-mentioned.

And the Board having also considered the essential defects which occur in the greater part of all the claims before them, from the omission to state (as former notices required) such circumstances respecting the credit and situation of debtors, at and subsequent to the Treaty of Peace, as may yet admit of evidence (in requiring and judging of which evidence, the Board will have due regard to all difficulties occasioned by lapse of time and other circumstances) and as may enable the Board on reasonable grounds to infer, that if the lawful impediments complained of had not existed, the debts in question would have been recovered:—

Ordered.—That such defects be supplied, by additional statements, as soon as possible:—And that in every instance where claimants are unable to give any account of the credit or situation of debtors, as above-mentioned, they state the particular enquiries they have made for the purpose of obtaining the information required; having it in view that, in pursuance of the powers conferred by Act of Parliament, it may be thought expedient, in aid of other evidence, to call on all claimants to make answer upon oath to such interrogatories as may be put to them, not only respecting the justice of their several demands, but also the truth (according to the best of their knowledge and belief) of all facts and circumstances set forth by them in support of the same:

Ordered.—That due notice be given of the above Resolution and Order, and that intimation again be made that the time limited for the reception of Claims will expire on the 1st day of June next.
