Alteration of Parish Areas.

PROPOSED ORDER No. XLI.

PARISHES OF DUNBLANE, BLACKFORD, AND MUTHILL.

(NEW PARISH OF ARDOCH.)

WHEREAS by Decree of the Lords of Council and Session, dated 21st February 1855, certain portions of the Parishes of Dunblane, Blackford, and Muthill, all as more fully described in the said Decree, were disjoined from these Parishes and erected into a separate Parish, since known as the Parish of Ardoch, excepting only in so far as regards the support and management of the poor, and all matters and questions connected therewith;

And whereas it has been represented to the Secretary for Scotland by the School Board of

Ardoch that he should issue an Order under section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, and section 46 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, forming the foresaid portions of the Parishes of Dunblane, Blackford, and Muthill, being the district under their jurisdiction, into a Parish;

And whereas the Authorities concerned have been consulted, and a local inquiry has been held;

And whereas I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the said representation;

And whereas a doubt has arisen as to the boundaries of the Parish of Ardoch before mentioned, and it is desirable to define of new the boundaries of the Parish constituted by this Order:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by the Local Government (Scotland) Acts, order as follows:—

1. The portions of the Parishes of Dunblane, Blackford, and Muthill contained within the boundary line described in the schedule annexed to this Order, shall be entirely disjoined from the Parishes of Dunblane, Blackford, and Muthill, and shall form a separate Parish, to be called the Parish of Ardoch.

2. The Parish Council of Ardoch shall assume responsibility for, and shall relieve the Parish Council of Dunblane, the Parish Council of Blackford, and the Parish Council of Muthill of all advances which the said Parish Councils respectively may be called on to make for or on account of, any pauper whose claim is derived

from birth prior to the 6th day of December 1898, or from residence for the statutory period prior to the 6th day of December 1898, in the said respective portions of the Parishes of Dunblane, Blackford, and Muthill.

3. In lieu of the existing County Council electoral divisions of Deanston, Kilmadock, and Dunblane and Lecropt, the following shall be the County Council electoral divisions of the County of Perth, numbered 55, 56, and 57 respectively :—

No.	Name of Division.	Contents of Division.
55	Kilmadock and Deanston.	The Parish of Kilmadock, exclusive of the portion included within the Police Burgh of Doune.
56	Ardoch.	The Parish of Ardoch.
57	Dunblane.	The Parish of Dunblane, exclusive of the portion included within the Police Burgh of Dunblane.

4. Nothing herein contained shall affect the rights of Creditors or persons having vested interests, and all questions of adjustment consequential on this Order are expressly reserved.

5. For the purpose of receiving the Parish Council register prior to the election of a Parish Council, and summoning the first statutory meeting of the Parish Council of Ardoch, in terms of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, the Inspector of Poor of the now existing Parish of Dunblane shall be deemed to be the Inspector of Poor of the Parish constituted by this Order.

6. This Order shall take effect at once for all purposes connected with County Council and Parish Council elections, and on the 6th day of December 1898 for all other purposes.

#### SCHEDULE.

##### BOUNDARY LINE OF THE NEW PARISH OF ARDOCH.

Beginning at the point on the north bank of the River Allan where the farm of Middle Cambushinnie joins the farm of Wester Cambushinnie, and thence north-west along the march of the said two farms till the said march meets the Kinbuck Road leading from Dunblane to Ardoch, then across the said road still north-westward and following the march between the farm of Ballanda and the said farm of Wester Cambushinnie until the said march strikes the Meikle Burn, and then west along the said burn as far as the march between the hill lands of the farm of Middle Cambushinnie and the farm of Wester Cambushinnie. It then follows this march in a north-westerly direction to the point on the boundary line of the Parishes of Muthill and Dunblane where the said two farms of Middle Cambushinnie and Wester Cambushinnie join, then north across the River Keir following the western march of the farm of Glenlichorn, which

now includes Arrevore, and proceeding north-east along the said march to the point on the east bank of the River Knaick where the north march line of the farm of Langside strikes the said river, then north-east along the said march to the road leading from Comrie to Ardoch, then across the said road north-easterly and then south-easterly, still following the north march of the farm of Langside to the point where it joins the north march of the farm of Greenscores, then eastward along the north march of the said farm of Greenscores till the said march joins the north march of the farm Muirhead, then eastward along the said march of the farm of Muirhead and across the old road from Ardoch to Muthill till the said march joins the north march of the estate of Orchill, then east and south-east along the march of estate of Orchill, including Kaimes Castle and Cameron Hill, till the said march strikes the march line between the Parishes of Muthill and Blackford, then south-east following the march of the Orchill Estate, including the lands of Rahalloch, till the said march strikes the road from Auchterarder to Ardoch, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of this road till it arrives at the march between the farm of Westerton and that of Carsebrook, which fence it would follow in a southerly direction till its junction with the River Allan, thence eastward along the south bank of the River Allan and the march of the Parishes of Dunblane and Blackford to the boundary between them about 300 yards east of the Buttergask Burn, thence along this boundary to the road from Blackford to Sheriffmuir, and along the centre of this road to where the Geordie Burn in the Balhaldie Estate crosses it, thence down the centre of this burn to the Greenloaning Dunblane Road, and thence along the centre of this road in a westerly direction to the Todhill Burn at Balhaldie, and thence down the centre of this burn to the River Allan, and along the Allan to the original starting point.

#### PROPOSED ORDER No. XLII.

##### PARISHES OF DUNBLANE AND LECROPT. (NEW PARISH OF DUNBLANE.)

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Secretary for Scotland by the Parochial Board of Dunblane that he should issue an Order, under section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, and section 46 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, uniting the Parish of Dunblane and the Parish of Lecropt into one Parish;

And whereas the Authorities concerned have been consulted and a local inquiry has been held;

And whereas I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the said representation:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of

the powers conferred upon me by the Local Government (Scotland) Acts, order as follows:—

1. The Parish of Dunblane and the Parish of Lecropt shall be united into one Parish, to be called the Parish of Dunblane.

2. The Parish Council of Lecropt and the Parish Council of the now existing Parish of Dunblane shall cease and determine, and their whole powers, rights, duties, property, liabilities, debts, officers, and servants shall be transferred to the Parish Council of the Parish constituted by this Order.

3. The School Board of the Parish of Lecropt and the School Board of the now existing Parish of Dunblane shall cease and determine, and their whole powers, rights, duties, property, liabilities, debts, officers, and servants shall be transferred to the School Board of the Parish constituted by this Order.

4. The members of the School Board elected for the now existing Parish of Dunblane, and such two of the members of the School Board of the Parish of Lecropt as shall be nominated by the last-mentioned Board prior to the 6th day of December 1898, shall together form the School Board of the Parish constituted by this Order, and shall hold office until the date of the next ensuing triennial election of School Boards in Scotland.

5. The said School Board shall meet on the 19th day of December 1898, at 3.30 P.M., in the County Buildings, Dunblane, and such meeting shall be deemed to be the first statutory meeting of the School Board.

6. Nothing herein contained shall affect the rights of Creditors or of persons having vested interests.

7. For the purpose of receiving the Parish Council Register prior to the election of a Parish Council, and summoning the first statutory meeting of the Parish Council of the Parish constituted by this Order, in terms of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, the Inspector of Poor of the now existing Parish of Dunblane shall be deemed to be the Inspector of Poor of the Parish constituted by this Order.

8. This Order shall take effect at once for all purposes connected with County Council and Parish Council elections, and on the 6th day of December 1898 for all other purposes.

Whereas on the ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six a Convention (hereinafter called the Berne Convention) with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works was concluded between Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain

and Ireland and the foreign countries following, that is to say:—

Belgium  
France  
Germany  
Hayti  
Italy  
Spain  
Switzerland and  
Tunis.

And whereas on the fifth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven the ratifications of the said Convention were duly exchanged between Her Majesty the Queen and the aforesaid countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and made under the authority committed to Her Majesty by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's Dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries (therein referred to as the foreign countries of the Copyright Union), and otherwise giving effect throughout Her Majesty's Dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the First Schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council hereinbefore recited, the foreign countries following, namely, Luxembourg, Monaco, Montenegro, and Norway, have acceded to the said Berne Convention, and by Orders in Council dated respectively the tenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the fifteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the sixteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and made under the authority aforesaid, the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven have been extended to the last-mentioned foreign countries respectively, and the last-mentioned foreign countries together with the foreign countries comprised in the said Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, now constitute the foreign countries of the Copyright Union within the meaning of the said Order in Council:

And whereas an additional Act to the said Berne Convention, of which additional Act an English translation is set out in the Schedule to this Order was agreed upon between Her Majesty and the following foreign countries for the purpose of varying the provisions of the said Berne Convention, namely:—

And the ratifications of the said additional Act were on the ninth day of September one thousand

eight hundred and ninety-seven exchanged between Her Majesty and the said foreign countries :

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the seventh day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and made under the authority aforesaid, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for varying the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and otherwise giving effect to the said additional Act throughout Her Majesty's dominions so far as regards the foreign countries hereinbefore named as parties to the said Additional Act, and an English translation of the said Additional Act is set forth in the schedule to the Order in Council now in recital :

And whereas it is provided by Article III. of the said Additional Act that countries of the Union not parties to the said Additional Act should at any time be allowed to accede thereto :

And whereas the Republic of Hayti has duly acceded to the said Additional Act :

And whereas Her Majesty in Council is satisfied that the Republic of Hayti has made such provisions as it appears to Her Majesty expedient to require for the protection of authors of works first produced in Her Majesty's dominions :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the seventh day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight shall extend to the Republic of Hayti.

2. Nothing contained in this Order shall prejudicially affect any right acquired or accrued before the commencement of this Order, by virtue of the said Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven or otherwise, and any person entitled to such right shall continue entitled thereto and to the remedies for the same in like manner as if this Order had not been made.

3. The author of any literary or artistic work first produced before the commencement of this Order shall have the rights and remedies to which he is entitled under section six of "The International Copyright Act, 1886" :

4. This Order shall be construed as if it formed part of "The International Copyright Act, 1886" :

5. This Order shall come into operation on the date hereof, which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders herein accordingly.

#### SCHEDULE.

##### ADDITIONAL ACT.

The following is an English translation of the Additional Act with the omission of the formal beginning and end :—

#### ARTICLE I.

The International Convention of the ninth September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six is modified as follows :—

1. ARTICLE II.—The first paragraph of Article II. shall run as follows :—

"Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives

shall enjoy in the other countries for their works, whether unpublished or published for the first time in one of those countries, the rights which the respective laws do now or shall hereafter grant to nationals."

A fifth paragraph is added in these terms :—

"Posthumous works are included among those to be protected."

2. ARTICLE III.—Article III. shall run as follows :—

"Authors not belonging to one of the countries of the Union who shall have published or caused to be published for the first time their literary or artistic works in a country which is a party to the Union shall enjoy, in respect of such works, the protection accorded by the Berne Convention, and by the present Additional Act."

3. ARTICLE V.—The first paragraph of Article V. shall run as follows :—

"Authors belonging to any one of the countries of the Union, or their lawful representatives, shall enjoy in the other countries the exclusive right of making or authorising the translation of their works during the entire period of their right over the original work. Nevertheless, the exclusive right of translation shall cease to exist if the author shall not have availed himself of it, during a period of ten years from the date of the first publication of the original work, by publishing or causing to be published in one of the countries of the Union a translation in the language for which protection is to be claimed."

4. ARTICLE VII.—Article VII. shall run as follows :—

"Serial stories, including tales, published in the newspapers or periodicals of one of the countries of the Union, may not be reproduced in original or translation, in the other countries, without the sanction of the authors or of their lawful representatives.

"This stipulation shall apply equally to other articles in newspapers or periodicals, when the authors or editors shall have expressly declared in the newspaper or periodical itself in which they shall have been published that the right of reproduction is prohibited. In the case of periodicals it shall suffice if such prohibition be indicated in general terms at the beginning of each number.

"In the absence of prohibition such articles may be reproduced on condition that the source is acknowledged.

"In any case the prohibition shall not apply to articles on political questions, to the news of the day, or to miscellaneous information."

5. ARTICLE XII.—Article XII. shall run as follows :—

"Pirated works may be seized by the competent authorities of the countries of the Union where the original work is entitled to legal protection.

"The seizure shall take place conformably to the domestic law of each State."

6. ARTICLE XX.—The second paragraph of Article XX. shall run as follows :—

"Such denunciation shall be made to the Government of the Swiss Confederation. It shall only be effective as regards the country making it, the Convention remaining in full force and effect for the other countries of the Union."

## ARTICLE II.

The Final Protocol annexed to the Convention of the ninth September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six is modified as follows:—

1. No. 1.—This clause shall run as follows:—

“As regards Article IV. it is agreed as follows:—

“(a) In countries of the Union where protection is accorded not only to architectural plans, but also to the architectural works themselves, these works shall be admitted to the benefits of the Berne Convention and of the present Additional Act.

“(b) Photographic works and works produced by an analogous process shall be admitted to the benefits of these engagements in so far as the laws of each State may permit, and to the extent of the protection accorded by such laws to similar national works.

“It is understood that an authorised photograph of a work of art shall enjoy legal protection in all the countries of the Union, as contemplated by the Berne Convention and by the present Additional Act, for the same period as the principal right of reproduction of the work itself subsists, and within the limits of private arrangements between those who have legal rights.”

2. No. 4.—This clause shall run as follows:—

“The common agreement contemplated in Article XIV. of the Convention is established as follows:—

“The application of the Berne Convention and of the present Additional Act to works which have not fallen into the public domain within the country of origin at the time when these engagements come into force, shall operate according to such stipulations on this head as may be contained in special Conventions either actually existing or to be concluded hereafter.

“In the absence of such stipulations between any of the countries of the Union the respective countries shall regulate each for itself, by its domestic legislation the manner in which the principle contained in Article XIV. is to be applied.

“The stipulations of Article XIV. of the Berne Convention and of the present clause of the Final Protocol shall apply equally to the exclusive right of translation in so far as such right is established by the present Additional Act.

“The temporary stipulations noted above shall be applicable to countries which may hereafter accede to the Union.”

## ARTICLE III.

The countries of the Union which are not parties to the present Additional Act, shall at any time be allowed to accede thereto on their request to that effect. This stipulation shall apply equally to countries which may hereafter accede to the Convention of the ninth September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. It will suffice for this purpose that such accession should be notified in writing to the Swiss Federal Council, who shall in turn communicate it to the other Governments.

## ARTICLE IV.

The present Additional Act shall have the same force and duration as the Convention of the ninth September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Paris, in the manner adopted in the case of that Convention as soon as possible, and within the space of one year at the latest.

It shall come into force as regards those countries which shall have ratified it three months after such exchange of ratifications.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction in and over the part of Africa known as Her Majesty's East Africa Protectorate (in this Order referred to as “the Protectorate”).

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her Majesty by “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890,” or otherwise, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) The silver rupee of British India of the standard weight and millesimal fineness specified in the First Schedule to this Order shall be the standard coin of the Protectorate.

(2) Every contract, sale, payment, bill, note, instrument, and security for money, and every transaction, dealing, matter, and thing whatever relating to money or involving the payment of, or the liability to pay, any money shall, in the absence of express agreement to the contrary, be held to be made, executed, entered into, done, and had in the Protectorate according to the standard coin of the Protectorate.

(3) The coin mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order shall be treated as equal to the standard coin.

2.—(1) If the Commissioner and Consul-General of the Protectorate (in this Order referred to as “the Commissioner”) at any time requests that any subsidiary coins of less value than the rupee, whether of silver, copper, bronze, or mixed metal be coined, and the Treasury and a Secretary of State approve the request, those subsidiary coins may be so coined under the direction of the Master of Our Mint, or at one of Our Mints in British India.

(2) The subsidiary coins so coined (in this Order referred to as new subsidiary coins) shall have either the same impressions as the coins specified in the Third Schedule to this Order (in this Order referred to as “existing subsidiary coins”), or such other impressions as may be approved by the Master of Our Mint and by a Secretary of State.

(3) Any new subsidiary coin may be of the same denomination as any existing subsidiary coin or of a different denomination.

(4) Every new subsidiary coin shall—

(a) if of silver be of the millesimal fineness of eight hundred and of a standard weight bearing the same proportion to the weight of the standard rupee as the denomination of the new coin bears to that rupee: and

(b) if of copper, bronze, or mixed metal, be of the standard weight specified in the proclamation by virtue of which the coin under this Order becomes legal tender in the Protectorate.

(5) In making the new subsidiary coins—

(a) a remedy or variation from the standard fineness required in the case of silver coins shall be allowed of three parts in one thousand; and

(b) A remedy or variation from the standard weight required shall be allowed—

(i) in the case of silver coins, exceeding in value one quarter of a rupee, of seven thousandth parts of the standard weight; and

(ii) in the case of silver coins, not exceeding in value one quarter of a rupee, of ten thousandth parts of the standard weight; and

(iii) in the case of coins of copper, bronze, or mixed metal of an amount not exceeding one fortieth part of the standard weight.

3.—(1) A tender of payment of money in the Protectorate, if made in standard coins, or any coins specified in the Second or Third Schedule to this Order, shall, if the coins have not been illegally dealt with, and when of silver have not become diminished in weight by wear or otherwise, so as to be of less weight than the weight in that behalf specified in the schedules to this Order as the least current weight be a legal tender—

(a) in the case of rupees for the payment of any amount;

(b) in the case of other silver coins for the payment of an amount not exceeding five rupees, but for no greater amount;

(c) in the case of coins of copper, bronze, or mixed metal, for the payment of an amount not exceeding one half of a rupee, but for no greater amount.

(2) Each coin shall be a legal tender only for the amount of its denomination.

(3) If any new subsidiary coins are coined under this Order, this Article shall, after the date fixed by the Commissioner in a proclamation, made with the approval of the Treasury and a Secretary of State, setting forth in a schedule the like particulars with respect to each coin as are set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order, apply to the new subsidiary coins, as if the schedule to the proclamation were added to that Third Schedule or substituted for that schedule either as set out in this Order, or as altered by any previous proclamation under this Article, or for so much of such schedule as is stated in the proclamation to be rescinded, and the schedule, or so much thereof as is stated in such proclamation to be rescinded, shall be rescinded accordingly.

4.—(1) For the purposes of this Order a coin shall be deemed to have been illegally dealt with where the coin has been impaired, diminished, or lightened, otherwise than by fair wear and tear, or has been defaced by having any name, word, device, or number stamped or engraved thereon, whether the coin has or has not been thereby diminished or lightened.

(2) Any coin which, by virtue of any proclamation under this Order, has ceased to be legal tender, or which has ceased to be legal tender in British India, or which has been illegally dealt with, or is below the least current weight, may be called in, cut, broken, or defaced under the authority of the Commissioner, in accordance with such regulations as the Commissioner may make.

5.—(1) No piece of gold, silver, copper, or bronze, or of any metal or mixed metal of any value whatever shall be made or issued in the

Protectorate, except under the authority of the Commissioner as a coin or a token for money, or as purporting that the holder thereof is entitled to demand any value denoted thereon.

(2) There shall not be imported into the Protectorate any counterfeit coins, or any coins which by reason of having been illegally dealt with, or being below the least current weight, are not legal tender, or any coins which, not being legal tender by or by virtue of this Order, are for the time being prohibited by a proclamation of the Commissioner to be imported.

(3) If any person acts in contravention of this Article he shall be guilty of an offence against the Africa Order in Council, 1889, and accordingly be liable to the punishment mentioned in Article fifty-six of that Order.

6.—(1) No person, other than a person acting under the authority of the Commissioner, given with the approval of the Treasury and a Secretary of State, shall make or issue within the Protectorate promissory notes payable to the bearer on demand, or shall circulate within the Protectorate any promissory notes payable to the bearer on demand, except the notes of the Government of British India, or any other notes authorised by the Commissioner in a proclamation made with the approval of the Treasury and a Secretary of State.

(2) If any person acts in contravention of this Article, that person shall be liable to forfeit to the Crown double the value of every note made, issued, or circulated in contravention of this Article.

7. The Commissioner may, by proclamation made with the approval of the Treasury and a Secretary of State, provide for giving within a limited period, not exceeding one month after the commencement of this Order, under the conditions, and at the rates specified in the proclamation, coins which are legal tender by virtue of this Order, in exchange for any coins specified in the proclamation which are not so legal tender, and which were in circulation as current money prior to the commencement of the Order, and such conditions shall provide for excluding from such exchange coins which appear to the Commissioner to have been imported for the purpose of being so exchanged.

8. Nothing in this Order shall affect any liability incurred, contract made, or other thing done before the commencement of the Order.

9. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression "the Treasury" means the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury;

The expression "Secretary of State" means one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for the time being;

The expression "person" includes a body of persons corporate or incorporate;

Words in the singular include the plural, and words in the plural include the singular.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, or on any earlier day on which it is proclaimed in the Protectorate by the Commissioner, and that day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of the Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Most Honourable the Marquess of Salisbury, K.G., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the requisite directions herein accordingly.
