TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank

of England, on Friday the 24th instant, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vict. cap. 2, and 52 Vict. cap. 6, to the amount of £1,720,000, in replacement of Bills falling due on the 30th instant.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1000, £5000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 30th instant, and will be payable at three months, or six months, or twelve months, after date (at the option of the persons tendering), viz., on the 30th June 1899, or 30th September 1899, or 30th March 1900 respectively.

3. *The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.*

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Saturday the 25th instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than three o'clock on Thursday the 30th instant.

6. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

In conformity with the provisions of the Statute 56 and 57 Victoria, cap. 66, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for India in Council proposes, with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, at the expiration of forty days from the date of this Gazette, to make alterations, as shown below, in the Regulations for the Admission of Candidates to the Civil Service of India, under section 32 of the Statute 21 and 22 Victoria, cap. 106.

I. For Regulation 9, which at present stands as follows:—

“9. Selected Candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects:—

Compulsory—	Marks.
1. Indian Penal Code and Criminal Procedure Code	500
2. The Principal Vernacular Language of the Province to which the Candidate is assigned	400
3. The Indian Evidence Act and the Indian Contract Act	500

In this Examination, as in the Open Competition, the merit of the Candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the Open Competition), and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The Examination will be conducted on paper and

viva voce, as may be deemed necessary. This Examination will be held at the close of the year of probation, and will be called the 'Final Examination'—

it is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"9. Selected Candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will be examined, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects (c.):—

In Hindustani the Candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character; and in the case of the last two Provinces mentioned above a Candidate whose Vernacular Language is either of the languages shown against his Province, must offer the other for examination.

If any Candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending such Examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held

in the following year, or at a special Examination."

II. For Regulation 11, which at present stands as follows:—

"11. The selected Candidates who, at the Final Examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the Regulations in force at the time for that Service"—

it is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"11. The selected Candidates who, on examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, conduct during the period of probation, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force at the time for that Service."

III. For Regulation 12, which at present stands as follows:—

"12. Persons desirous to be admitted as Candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from 'The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.,' at any time after the 1st December, in the year previous to that in which the Examination is to be held. The forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the 31st May (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the Examination is to be held"—

it is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"12. Persons desirous to be admitted as Candidates, must apply on forms, which may be obtained from the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W., at any time after the 1st December, in the year previous to that in which the Examination is to be held. The forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the 1st July (or, if that date should fall upon a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the Examination is to be held."

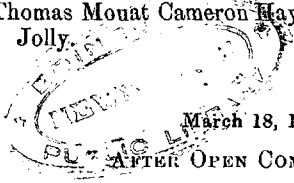
