## TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday the 10th instant, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vict. cap. 2, 52 Vict. cap. 6, and 63 Vict. cap. 2, to the amount of £3,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1000, £5000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 15th instant, and will be payable at three months, or six months, or twelve months, after date (at the option of the persons tendering), viz., on the 15th February or 15th May next, or 15th November 1900 respectively.

3. *The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.*

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Saturday the 11th instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than three o'clock on Wednesday the 15th instant.

6. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

The Board of Trade, by virtue of the power conferred upon them by section 369 (2) of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, do order that, as from the date of this Order, Sea Fishing Boats registered at any Port in the United Kingdom, of the following class, that is to say, Steam Fishing Vessels employed in Line Fishing, but which are also fitted for use as Trawlers, shall be exempt, and they are hereby exempted, from such portion of Part IV. of the said Act as is contained in section 414 (2).

3. To provide that the making of a call in terms of the Act for the purpose of converting the same into preference capital shall not affect

the rights at present enjoyed by parties who have heretofore paid moneys to the Company in advance of calls, and to confer upon the Company power to compound with such parties.

5. To define and determine the rights and preferences of the preference capital or preference stock into which calls paid or moneys paid in advance of calls may be converted as aforesaid, including the voting power thereof, and also to define and determine the voting power of the ordinary capital.

6. To provide for re-arranging the capital of the Company by cancellation of a portion of its uncalled capital.

7. To alter and extend the existing borrowing power of the Company.

8. To provide for the filing of the said Act and of any memoranda executed with reference thereto.

9. To provide that references to the shares of the Company, in testamentary and other instruments executed before the passing of the Act, shall apply to the classes of shares or stock to be created under the Act.

10. To save the effect of the Act as regards acts done or proceedings pending by or against the Company, and to provide that the expenses of and incidental to the Act shall be paid by the Company.
