Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Vifcount Nelson, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the Mediterranean, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated on board his Majesty's ship the Victory, at sea, the 16th November 1803.

Sin,

I herewith transmit to you, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, copy of a letter sum Capt. CRACKAFT, of his Majesty's ship Anson, together with copy of one therein alluded to from Capt. RAINS-FORD, of the Morgiana, giving an account of the capture of a French privateer.—I am, &c. Nelson & Bronte.

Anfon, off Cape Spartivento, Oct. 20, 1803.

MY LORD. I have the honour to transmit your Lordship the copy of a letter I have received from Capt. RAINSFORD, of his Majesty's brig Morgiana, acquainting me of her having captured La Mague-rite French privateer, of four guns and 40 men, on the 15th instant.

His Majesty's sloop Morgiana, off Cape
S1R, Spartevento, October 16, 1803.

I have the honour to acquaint you that, being in chace of two veffels on the morning of the 15th instant, I observed a vessel under lateen fails, with her fweeps out, haul out from under the land, and gave chace to us, with English colours and a red flag flying. I continued my course until she came within gun-shot, when, discovering us to be a man of war, she made fail from us. I immedistely gave chace, and fired feveral shot at her, when she hoisted French colours, and soon after

came to an anchor. I then fent the boats under the command of Lieutenant LAWRENCE, with orders to examine her, and, if he met with refistance, to bring her off.

This fervice was executed with great gallantry by him and the people under his command, who boarded and carried her under a fmart fire of grape-shot and musketry. She proves to be Marguerite French privateer, mounting two fix and two four-pounders, manned with forty men, three of whom only remained on board on taking possession. I am forry to add, that I had one feaman badly wounded, who is fince dead.

Sir,

You will please to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that this morning the fquadron under my command captured Le Renard French national schooner, mounting 12 4-pounders, with 6 swivels, and manned with 80 men; also Le Titus transport, having on board 96 soldiers, from Corsica, bound to Toulon I am, &c. Extract of a letter from Captain George Hart, of his Majefly's fhip Monmouth, dated Gibralter Bay, the 9th December 1803, to the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Nelson, K. B. Duke of Bronte, Vice Admiral of the Blue, and Commander in Chief, &c. &c. &c.

I HAVE great fatisfaction in transmitting to your Lordship a copy of Captain Gore's letter to me of yesterday's date, giving an account of his having captured a French privateer off Cabrita Point, called L'Esperance, of two 12 and two 6 pounders, with 70 men, and destroying another, by driving her on shere. I beg leave to refer your Lordship to the particulars of the capture, &c. as stated in Captain Gore's letter; and beg leave to add the high opinion I entertain of Captain Gore's great readiness in putting to fea, and of his able conduct throughout on the occasion, which I had the pleasure to witness.

His Majesty's ship Medusa, off New Mole Head, Gibraltar, Dec. 8, 1803. SIR.

As from your fituation you could not fee the caule of the manœuvres of his Majesty's ship Medusa this day, I have the honour to acquaint you, for the information of the Right Honourable Lord Nelson, Commander in Chief, &c. &c. &c that at ten A. M. I observed a cutter standing in for the westward, and two French privateers (Felucca rigged) standing out from
