- 1. The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, viz. :-

SPECIAL REGULATIONS (supplementary to the General Regulations issued 8th April 1872, and amended by subsequent Notices in the London Gazette) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Assistant Surveyor of Buildings (Second Class) in the Architectural Department of the Board of Public Works, Ireland.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

I. The limits of age for this situation are 24 and 30, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

II. Candidates will be required to show what technical Education and practical training they have undergone to qualify themselves for a situation of this nature. They must show (1) that they have served for at least five years, in a public or private office, under an Architect, and have had at least three years' experience in designing and carrying out buildings; (2) that the works on which they have been engaged during those years were such as to afford them the opportunity of gaining a satisfactory knowledge of their profession; and (3) that they have fully profited by their practical training, and possess the necessary qualifications and experience. Evidence on these points must be sent in at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint. If such evidence should prove prima facie satisfactory, the Candi date will be admitted to Examination, subject, in the case of his being successful in the competition, to such further inquiry, and the production of such further evidence, as may be necessary.

III. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :-

- 1. English Composition: Writing a business letter from rough notes, or a short essay on some subject connected with the profession.

 Drawing (simple).
 (a) Drawing and Design in Architectural Works.

- (b) Details of Construction (including Theory of Construction) in Architectural Works.
- 3. Quantities: Taking out quantities from Drawings and Measurement of Works executed.
- 4. Estimates and Specifications.
- *5. Use and Properties of Materials.
- *6. Surveying and Levelling.
- 7. Sanitary Science as applied to Buildings. In the subjects marked thus * there will be an Oral Examination.
- IV. No Candidate will be eligible who fails to pass in any of the above-mentioned subjects.
- V. Applications for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in

such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

VI. A fee of £3 will be required from every Candidate attending the Examination.

ABERDEEN CORPORATION TRAMWAYS.

BYE-LAWS and Regulations made by the Lord Provost, D Magistrates, and Town Council of the City and Royal Burgh of Aberdeen, under the powers of section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. The bye-laws and regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all the tramway cars and tramway carriages (hereinafter called "cars") of the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the City and Royal Burgh of Aberdeen (hereinafter called "the Town Council of the Coun Royal Burgh of Aberdeen (hereinafter called "the Town Council"), and to all places with respect to which the Town Council, acting under the Aberdeen Corporation Tramway Acts, 1872 to 1899, have power to make byelaws and regulations.

2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a car by the rear or Conductor's platform, and not otherwise. This bye-law shall not apply to any car standing at a tarminus.

terminus.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any car.
4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any car, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any car, and if found in or upon any car shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the Conductor.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any car, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on any car, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any car. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, be liable to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the

8. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the Conductor of a car, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, and any person who, in the opinion of the Conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any car, and may be prevented from entering or mounting any car, and shall not enter or mount any car after having been requested not to do so by the Conductor, and, if found in or upon any car, shall, on request by the conductor, leave the car, upon the fare, if previously paid,

conductor, leave the car, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the Conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Town Council the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall produce his ticket to the Conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Town Council when required so to do, or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled by such passenger.

11. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the Conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any car. roof of any car.

12. No passenger shall travel on the steps or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any car.

13. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any car, and no person shall hold by or hang to any part of any car.

14. When any car contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional

person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such car when warned by the Conductar not to do so.

15. When a car contains the full licensed number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on

16. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt

to enter, mount, or leave, any car whilst in motion.
'17. No person shall enter or mount, or attempt to enter or mount, any car arriving or standing at a terminus or

stopping place until such passengers as may be upon the car, and desire to dismount, shall have had a reasonable opportunity of doing so.

18. No person shall take a dog or other animal into or on any car. Any dog or other animal in or on any car shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the car immediately upon request by the Conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the Conductor.

19. No person shall travel in or on any car with loaded

firearms.

20. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Town Council in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any car or tramway.

21. The Conductor of each car shall to the best of his

ability enforce and prevent the breach of these bye-laws

and regulations.

22. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these bye-laws or regulations shall be

liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.


23. The expression "Conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Town Council,

and having charge of a car.

24. A printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position

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
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
