THE MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1894.

(57 and 58 Vict. c. 60.)

WHEREAS by an Order, dated the 2nd day of November 1899, the Board of Trade, by virtue of the power conferred upon them by section 369 (2) of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, did order that, as from the date of the said Order, fishing boats registered at any port in the United Kingdom of the following class, that is to say, steam fishing vessels employed in line-fishing, but which are also fitted for use as trawlers, should be exempt, and they were thereby exempted from such portion of Part IV. of the said Act as is contained in section 414 (2).

And whereas it appears to the Board of Trade to be expedient to revoke the said Order.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade, by virtue of the power conferred upon them by section 369 (2) of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, do by this Order revoke the said Order, dated the 2nd day of November 1899, as from the date hereof, but such revocation shall not prejudice or affect anything duly done or any right or privilege acquired whilst the said Order was in operation.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION,

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS (framed in pursuance of Act 40 and 41 Vict. cap. 57) respecting Open Competitive Examinations for Junior Clerkships in the High Court of Justice, Ireland.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

1. Open Competitive Examinations of Candidates for this situation will be held from time to time as may be deemed expedient.

2. These Examinations are open to all natural-born subjects of Her Majesty, being of the prescribed age, and of good health and character.

3. The limits of age for this situation are 20 and 30. Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

NOTE.—After the 1st July 1901 the limits of age will be 20 and 25.

All Candidates will be required to satisfy the Commissioners in subjects 1 to 9. The subjects 10, 11, 12, and 13 are optional.

5. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Commissioners.

6. A fee of £3 will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.

7. At each Examination will be filled (provided there be Candidates duly qualified) (a) the vacancies existing at the time of the Examination; (b) any additional vacancies occurring within six months from the date of the announcement of the result of the Examination which the Lord Chancellor of Ireland may desire to have so filled.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in Dublin, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 11th December 1900.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 28th November, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
