THE following Address was presented to His Majesty at St. James' Palace on the 20th instant:—

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

We, Your Majesty's loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Rector, Principal, and Professors and University Court of the University of Edinburgh, desire to tender to Your Majesty an expression of the profound sorrow with which, in common with all institutions and individuals throughout the Empire, we mourn the death of our late revered Sovereign, Queen Victoria, and we would humbly submit to Your Majesty our respectful sympathy in the irreparable bereavement which has befallen the Royal Family.

We recall with devout gratitude that the reign which has closed, while it exceeded in duration that of any previous occupant of the Throne, has, under the blessing of Providence, been productive of unexampled benefits in every degree of life and in every sphere of human interest, and that Her Majesty, our late Queen, has bequeathed to Her people an imperishable memory of nobility, purity, and wisdom.

Especially are we thankful for those marks of signal favour bestowed by our late Sovereign upon this University, which, since Her Majesty's Accession, has advanced from the position of a Municipal dependency to that of an autonomous Corporation, while the number of its members has greatly multiplied, so that within its precincts

are congregated students not only from all parts of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, but also from our Colonies and our Indian Empire.

And now, may it please Your Majesty, we would beg in a spirit of dutiful loyalty to offer to Your Majesty our congratulations on Your Accession to an historic and illustrious Throne, and to assure Your Majesty of our unswerving fidelity and devotion.

We would avail ourselves of the august occasion to recall with pride that Your Majesty was in 1859–60 a matriculated student of the University of Edinburgh, which may thus claim to have had a share in preparing Your Majesty for the high destiny to which Your Majesty has now been called.

It is also a source of satisfaction to us to reflect that upon the last occasion of Your Majesty's presence in Edinburgh, it was within the precincts of the University that Your Majesty was admitted a Burgess of the City of Edinburgh.

It is our humble and hearty prayer that Your Majesty, following in the steps of Your August Predecessor, may long be spared to rule over a prosperous and united people.

COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTORAL DIVISIONS OF FIFESHIRE.

PARISHES OF WEMYSS AND BEATH.

Order by the Secretary for Scotland.

WHEREAS since the date of the Order of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland forming Electoral Divisions for the County of Fife, a material change of circumstances has occurred in respect of the population and annual value of the Electoral Divisions in the Parishes of Wemyss and Beath, in the said County.

And whereas the County Council have applied to me for a rearrangement of the Electoral Divisions within the said Parishes; and whereas I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the proposal of the said County Council.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, K.T., His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, order as follows:—

The Order of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, dated 3rd November 1891, dealing with the Electoral Divisions of the County of Fife, is hereby recalled, in so far as it relates to the Parish of Wemyss, in the County of Fife, and from and after this date the said Parish of Wemyss, so far as it is not included within the limits of the Police Burgh of Buckhaven, Methil, and Innerleven, shall be divided into two Electoral Divisions, having the following names and contents, that is to say:—

WEST WEMYSS.—That part of the Parish of Wemyss which lies to the west of a line beginning at a point at the Parish boundary 150 feet north-west from the north corner of the Standing Stone Plantation, thence along the north-east side of the said plantation to the Standing Stone Road, thence north-eastward along the said road to the north end of Newton Farm service road, thence along the said Newton Farm service road and through Newton Farm steading till the public road from Kirkcaldy to Leven is reached, thence in a direct line to the chimney of the Michael Pit, thence southward in a direct line to the sea at high water mark.

EAST WEMYSS.—The remainder of the Parish of Wemyss, exclusive of the portion included within the limits of the Police Burgh of Buckhaven, Methil, and Innerleven.

The Order of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland, dated 3rd November 1891, dealing with the Electoral Divisions of the County of Fife, is hereby recalled in so far as it relates to the Parish of Beath, in the County of Fife, and from and after this date the said Parish of Beath shall be divided into two Electoral Divisions, having the following names and contents, that is to say:—

BEATH, NORTH.—That part of the Parish of Beath which lies north of the following line, viz.:—A line from the eastmost point in the boundary between the Parishes of Beath and Balingry, which is touched by the Lochfitty Burn, following westwards the course of the said burn to the bridge near Muirtown Farm, on the road between Cantsdam and Kingseat, thence along the said road in a westerly direction to the boundary at Lochend, near Lochfitty Loch, between the Parishes of Beath and Dunfermline.

BEATH, SOUTH.—That portion of the said Parish of Beath which lies to the south side of the said line forming the south boundary of Beath North Electoral Division, including the Police Burgh of Cowdenbeath, or the portion of the said parish which is outside the Beath North Electoral Division.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Monday the 1st proximo, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vict. cap. 2, and 52 Vict. cap. 6, to the amount of £1,000,000, in replacement of Bills falling due on the 6th proximo.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1000, £5000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 6th April 1901, and will be payable at six months after date, viz., on the 6th October 1901.

3. The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for; and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Tuesday the 2nd proximo, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than one o'clock on Saturday the 6th proximo.

6. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 25TH MARCH 1901.)

FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1901.

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Animals from the Republic of Chile Prohibited.

1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, it shall not be lawful to land any animal brought from the country of the Republic of Chile, and the First Schedule (Prohibited Countries and Parts of Countries) to the Foreign Animals Order of 1896 shall be read and have effect as if that country were included in the list of prohibited countries and parts of countries mentioned in that Schedule.

Interpretation.

2. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1896.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May one thousand nine hundred and one.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1901.
