THE King has been graciously pleased to signify His intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the under-mentioned Officers, whose claims have been submitted for His Majesty's approval, for their conspicuous bravery in South Africa, as stated against their names:—

Regiment.	Name.	Act of Courage for which recommended.
1st Imperial Light Horse	Surgeon-Captain T. J. Crean	During the action with De Wet at Tygerskloof, on the 18th December 1901, this Officer continued to attend to the wounded in the firing line, under a heavy fire at only 150 yards range, after he had himself been wounded, and only desisted when he was hit a second time, and, as it was at first thought, mortally wounded.
5th Victorian Mounted Rifles	Lieutenant L. C. Maygar	At Geelhoutboom, on the 23rd November 1901, Lieutenant Maygar galloped out and ordered the men of a detached post, which was being outflanked, to retire. The horse of one of them being shot under him, when the enemy were within 200 yards, Lieutenant Maygar dismounted and lifted him on to his own horse, which bolted into boggy ground, causing both of them to dismount. On extricating the horse and finding that it could not carry both, Lieutenant Maygar again put the man on its back, and told him to gallop for cover at once, he himself proceeding on foot. All this took place under a very heavy fire.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

BURGH OF INVERNESS.

INTIMATION is hereby given that the Provost, Magistrates, and Councilors of the Royal Burgh of Inverness, Elgin, and Nairn at Inverness, a Petition praying the Court to revise, alter, and extend the Boundaries of the Royal Burgh of Inverness, so as to include within said Boundaries the area comprised within and between the existing Parliamentary Boundaries of the said Burgh and a line commencing at a point on the seashore in the middle of the bed of the Mill Burn, thence running up the centre of the Mill Burn to a point situated thirty feet north of the north or lower wall of the bridge at Kingsmills carrying the road leading from Inverness to Culcabock, thence in a straight line to a point on the east side of the Culduthel Road two hundred yards to the south of Mile End Cottage, that is three hundred and thirteen yards south of the first mile stone from Inverness, thence in a straight line due west to the east or south-east bank of the River Ness at a point three hundred and sixty feet from the west side of the Dores Road measured on the same straight line, thence in a straight line to the centre of the swing bridge over the Caledonian Canal at Tomnahurich; and thence along the centre of the canal to the point where said line meets the existing Parliamentary Boundary of the said Burgh, being seven hundred and twelve feet south of the centre of the top canal lock gate when closed, as the said area is shown and delineated in red on a Plan produced with said Petition; or otherwise, to revise, alter, and extend the said Boundaries so as to include within the same so much of said area as to the Court may seem just and proper; to define in a written Deliverance the altered, revised, and extended Boundaries of the said Burgh in manner aforesaid until the new Boundary reaches the existing Burgh Boundary, and thence along the said Boundary to the old pier at Clachnaharry, and from thence along the seashore to the point first herein mentioned as the beginning of the Boundaries, or in such other manner as to the Court may seem proper; to declare the area comprised within the said altered, revised, and extended Boundaries to be and constitute the Burgh of Inverness for the purposes of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892, and, so far as competent and applicable, of the Town Councils (Scotland) Act, 1900; to fix, determine, and define the Wards of the Burgh in such manner as to comprehend within the three Wards thereof the whole of the said proposed extension, and to revise, alter, and extend the existing Ward Boundaries accordingly; to determine all questions that may arise in reference to the matters embraced in the said Petition; to appoint the Deliverance of the Court to be recorded in the Court Books and in the Minute-Book of the Town Council of the said Burgh; and to find and declare that the whole expenses incurred by the Pursuers and by the Court in carrying out the proceedings under the said Petition shall be defrayed out of the Burgh General Assessment to be levied within the said Burgh, in terms of the said Acts.

And that the Sheriff of Inverness, Elgin, and Nairn has pronounced the following Deliverance on said Petition:—

INTIMATION is hereby given that DUNCAN CAMPBELL, Esquire of Inverneil and Ross, in the County of Argyll, Heir of Entail in possession of (one) the Entailed Estates of INVERNEIL, lying in the Barony of Kilmichael, Lordship of Knapdale, Parish of South Knapdale and County of Argyll (both property and superiority thereof); and (two) the Entailed Estate of ROSS, lying in the Parish of North
