* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

LANARKSHIRE (MIDDLE WARD
DISTRICT) WATER.

(Power to the District Committee of the Middle Ward of the County of Lanark to Construct Additional Waterworks, and Supply Water, and to Abandon Certain Authorised Works; Acquisition of Lands and Easements; Appropriation of Water; to Sanction and Confirm Acts and Expenditure of the District Committee on Conduit Connecting their Logan Reservoir with Filters at Glasford; to Extend the Time Limited by the Lanarkshire (Middle Ward District) Water Act, 1896, for the Completion of the Glengavel Reservoir; and to Revive and Extend the Powers granted by that Act for the Purchase of Lands for and for the Completion of the Road of Access authorised by that Act; to Extend the Time for the Compulsory Purchase of Lands for and for the Completion of the Railway and Works authorised by the Lanarkshire (Middle Ward District) Water Act, 1899; Rates, Assessments, Rents, and Charges; Borrowing Powers to County Council; Costs of Order; Incorporation Application and Amendment of Acts)

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Secretary for Scotland in the month of April next, by Petition,

for a Provisional Order under the above Act (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") for all or some of the following, among other purposes (that is to say):—

1.—To authorise the District Committee of the Middle Ward of the County of Lanark (hereinafter called "the District Committee") to make, maintain, and use the Waterworks hereinafter described, or some of them, that is to say:—

FIRST.—A service reservoir at Tannochside, in the Parish of Bothwell (hereinafter called "Reservoir (L)"), to be situate within the enclosure numbered 1977 on the twenty-five inch Ordnance Survey Map of the Parish of Bothwell, published in 1898, about one hundred and thirteen yards south of the north-east corner of said enclosure;
