THE SCOTTISH AND NEW ZEALAND INVESTMENT COMPANY LIMITED AND REDUCED.

A PETITION has been presented to the Lords of Council and Session (First Division, —Mr. Couper, Clerk), by the Scottish and New Zealand Investment Company Limited and Reduced, for an Order confirming reduction of capital, and, *inter alia*, praying their Lordships to fix the date at which every Creditor entitled to any debt or claim against the Company, within the meaning of section 13 of the Companies Act, 1867, shall be entitled to object to the proposed reduction of the Company's capital; to fix a day on or before which the Creditors of the Company not entered on the list of Creditors are to claim to be entered thereon, or are to be excluded from objecting to the proposed reduction, and to appoint advertisement of the days so fixed; to settle a list of Creditors entitled to object to the proposed reduction; to find that they have either consented to the reduction, or that their debts have been discharged or secured, or have determined; and thereafter to make an Order confirming the reduction of the capital of the said Company from £500,000 sterling, divided into 100,000 Ordinary Shares of £5 each, on which £1 has been paid up, to £75,000 sterling, divided into 100,000 Ordinary Shares of 15s. each, fully paid, all in terms of a Special Resolution passed at an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company held on 7th March 1902, and confirmed at the subsequent Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company held on 28th March 1902; to dispense altogether, or after such short period as their Lordships might appoint, with the words "and reduced" as part of the name of the Company, and to approve of the Minute set forth in the Petition, all as fully set forth in the said Petition; on which Petition the Lord Ordinary officiating on the Bills has been pleased to pronounce an Interlocutor in the following terms:—
