LORD CHAMBERLAIN'S OFFICE,
ST. JAMES' PALACE, April 4, 1902.

NOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty the King will hold a Levée at St. James' Palace on Monday the 21st of April, and on Monday the 12th of May next, at twelve o'clock noon, and that for these and all future Levées Cards of Admission will be required, as the numbers at each of these Ceremonies must be limited.

The following are the rules to be observed:—

ATTENDANCES AND PRESENTATIONS.

1. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

2. All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Army, Militia, Yeomanry, or Volunteers, of whatever rank, except those on the Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Adjutant-General at the War Office, stating clearly whether they desire to attend or to be presented; if the latter, stating by whom and on what occasion. Deputy Lieutenants of Counties will also communicate and obtain their cards from the War Office.

3. Officers of the Household Cavalry and Foot Guards on the active list will make application to the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace for cards of admission and presentation. All retired Officers of the Household Cavalry and Brigade of Guards will apply to the War Office.

4. All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

5. All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall.

6. Similarly, all Gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office, the Home Office, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament or any Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation at Levées from the Department under which they serve.

7. Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, are requested to make their applications through the Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

8. Peers, Bishops, Lords Lieutenant of Counties, Members of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all Gentlemen other than the above-mentioned, will be good enough to communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace, when they will each be furnished with a card of admission for use at the Levée.

The names both for attendance and presentation must be received at the various Offices above indicated not later than eight days prior to the date of each Levée.

The King has been pleased by Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual bearing date the 31st day of March 1902, to direct the issue under the Seal appointed by the Treaty of Union to be kept and made use of in place of the Great Seal of Scotland of a Commission of Inquiry into the subject of Physical Training in Scotland as follows:—

EDWARD THE SEVENTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, to—

Our right trusty and right well-beloved Cousin William David, Earl of Mansfield (Chairman);

Our trusty and well-beloved Thomas Horatio Arthur Ernest Cochrane, Esquire (commonly called the Honourable Thomas Horatio Arthur Ernest Cochrane, Member of Parliament;

Our trusty and well-beloved Sir Thomas Glen-Coats, Baronet;

Our trusty and well-beloved Sir Henry Craik, Knight Commander of Our Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Doctor of Laws, Secretary of the Committee of Our Privy Council on Education in Scotland;

Our trusty and well-beloved Michael Hugh Shaw-Stewart, Esquire, Member of Parliament;

Our trusty and well-beloved James Carfrae Alston, Esquire, President of the Boy's Brigade.

Our trusty and well-beloved John Blackburn Fergusson, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, Chairman of the School Board of Alloway;

Our trusty and well-beloved George M'Crae, Esquire, Member of Parliament; and

Our trusty and well-beloved Alexander Ogston, Esquire, Doctor of Medicine, Master of Surgery; Professor of Surgery in Our University of Aberdeen. Greeting!

Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to inquire into the opportunities for physical training now available in the State-aided schools and other educational institutions of Scotland; and to suggest means by which such training may be made to conduce to the welfare of the pupils; and, further, how such opportunities may be increased by continuation classes and otherwise, so as to develop, in their practical application to the requirements of life, the faculties of those who have left the day schools, and thus to contribute towards the sources of national strength.

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge, discretion, and ability, have nominated, constituted, and appointed, and do by these presents nominate, constitute, and appoint, you, the said William David, Earl of Mansfield; Thomas Horatio Arthur Ernest Cochrane; Sir Thomas Glen-Coats; Sir Henry Craik; Michael Hugh Shaw-Stewart; James Carfrae Alston; John Blackburn Fergusson; George M'Crae; and Alexander Ogston to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry.

And for the better enabling you Our said Commissioners to make the said inquiry, We do by these Presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to call before you, or any three or more of you, such persons as you may judge necessary, by whom you may be the better informed of the matters herein submitted for your consideration, and every matter con-

nected therewith; and also to call for, have access to, and examine, all such books, documents, papers, or records as you shall judge likely to afford you the fullest information on the subject of this Our Commission; and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do further by these presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem expedient for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you, or any three or more of you, do with as little delay as possible report to Us under your hands and seals upon the matters referred to you as aforesaid, and that you may have power to certify to Us, from time to time, your several proceedings in respect of the matters aforesaid, if it may seem expedient to you so to do.

And We further will and command, and by these presents ordain, that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And for your assistance in the execution of these presents, We do hereby nominate and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Robert Barclay Pearson, Esquire, Advocate, to be Secretary to this Our Commission.

Given at Our Court at Saint James', the thirty-first day of March one thousand nine hundred and two, in the second year of Our Reign.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
