

opy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Ma-jefty's ships and vessels at Jamaica, to William Marf-den, Esq. dated Port Royal, March 24, 1804. SIR,

You will herewith receive, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a letter from Captain Ross, of his Majefty's fhip Pique, stating the capture of the French national cutter Terreur, on the 18th inft. which arrived at this port last evening. I am, &c. J Т. Duckworth.

His Majesty's ship Le Pique, off Jacmee, SIR, March 18. 1804.

I have the honour to inform you, that, after a chace of five hours, this day, we came up with and captured the Frenchi national cutter La Terreur of ten guns, (fix of which they threw over-board in the chace,) and seventy-sive men, com-mand d by Mons. Collinet, Lieutenant de Vais-seau, from Santo Domingo two days, and had taken nothing.

Copy of another Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. &c. to William Mariden, Eig. dated at Jamaica the 7th April 1804.

I transmit you herewith a letter from Captain Le Geyts, of his Majesty's ship Stork, stating the capture of a selucca privateer; there are also two other privateers captured since our last, according to the accompanying list, which I beg you to lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admirater. I have the honour to acquaint you, that his Majesty's sloop under my command has this day captured, after a chace of fix hours, the French felucca privateer L'Hirondelle, of three guns (two of which were thrown overboard in chace) and forty-four men. She has been three months from Guadaloupe, but latt from Banacoa, and had taken nothing.

Having directed Captain Murray to chace a fchooner, which was discovered a-head of the convoy yesterday afternoon, you will be pleased to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, by half past feven o'clock that evening, she was captured by the Franchise, and proves to be La Petite Harmonie privateer from Martinique, mounting two four-pound carriage guns, commanded by Citizen Guerel, and man-ned with twenty-two men. I have ordered her to be destroyed; and am, &c.
