Whereas We have deemed it expedient that
 a Commission should forthwith issue to inquire
 into the Military preparations for the War in
 South Africa, and into the supply of men, ammu-
 nition, equipment, and transport by sea and land
 in connection with the Campaign, and into the
 Military operations up to the occupation of
 Pretoria:

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust
 and confidence in your knowledge and ability,
 have authorised and appointed, and do by these
 presents authorise and appoint you, the said
 Victor Alexander, Earl of Elgin and Kincardine;
 Reginald Baliol, Viscount Esher; Sir George
 Dashwood Taubman-Goldie; Sir Henry Wylie
 Norman; Sir John Ommaney Hopkins; Sir
 John Edge; and Sir John Jackson to be
 Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said
 inquiry.

And for the better effecting the purposes of
 this Our Commission, We do by these presents
 give and grant unto you, or any three or more
 of you, full power to call before you such persons
 as you shall judge likely to afford you any
 information upon the subject of this our Com-
 mission; and also to call for, have access to, and
 examine all such books, documents, registers, and
 records as may afford you the fullest information
 on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning
 the premises by all other lawful ways and means
 whatsoever.

And We do by these presents authorise and
 empower you, or any three or more of you,
 to visit and personally inspect such places as you
 may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more
 effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

And We do by these presents will and ordain
 that this Our Commission shall continue in full
 force and virtue, and that you Our said Com-
 missioners, or any three or more of you, may from
 time to time proceed in the execution thereof,
 and of every matter and thing therein contained,
 although the same be not continued from time to
 time by adjournment.

And we do further ordain that you, or any
 three or more of you, have liberty to report your
 proceedings under this Our Commission from
 time to time if you shall judge it expedient so
 to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you
 do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us
 under your hands and seals, or under the hands

and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

Given at Our Court at Balmoral, the ninth day of September one thousand nine hundred and two, in the second year of Our Reign.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
