CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION,

December 12, 1902.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the Situation of Male Sorter in London in the Department of the Postmaster-General.

These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

1. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That their age on the day of the Examination is not less than 18 nor more than 21.

NOTE.—In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served in the Army or

Navy, or for two full consecutive years either in a Civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, or as Registered Copyists in connection with the Civil Service, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service. In the case of soldiers whose period of Military Service has been compulsorily extended by the Military Authorities, the period to be deducted may be extended beyond five years, if necessary. Any person entitled to the benefit of this extension should call special attention to his claim when filling up the form of application for permission to compete.

(b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

NOTE.—No Candidate will be eligible for appointment who is less than 5 feet 4 inches in height, or who fails to satisfy the Medical Officers of the Post Office that he is free from any physical defect, disease, or weakness which would be likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his duties, or with his regular and continuous attendance.

Re-vaccination will be required before appointment unless the Candidate exhibits good marks of primary and secondary vaccination, or good marks of vaccination with definite evidence of having had small-pox.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

3. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. English Composition (including Writing and Spelling).
2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).
3. Geography (general).

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate, in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners, a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.

4. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service, Engineer Students in the Navy, and Apprentices in His Majesty's Dockyards, must obtain the written permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the Examination, dated before the commencement of the competition.

5. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

6. A fee of four shillings will be required from every Candidate attending the Examination.
