Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to inquire into the subject of Trade Disputes and Trade Combinations and as to the law affecting them, and to report on the law applicable to the same and the effect of any modifications thereof;

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorised and appointed, and do by these presents authorise and appoint, you, the said Andrew Graham Murray; Sir William Thomas

Lewis; Sir Godfrey Lushington; Arthur Cohen; and Sidney Webb to be Our Commissioners for

the purposes of the said inquiry.

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to, and examine all such books, documents, registers, and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do by these presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient to so inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.

Aud We do by these presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And We do further ordain that you, or any

three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

ADMIRALTY, June 6, 1903.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have recently drawn the attention of the Secretaries of the several British Yacht Clubs possessing Admiralty Warrants to the circular letter of the 24th May 1883, in which they were informed that yachts flying the white or blue ensigns of His Majesty's Fleet would be treated by the Ottoman Government as Men of War, and would consequently be compelled to obtain an Imperial Iradé before being allowed to pass the Dardanelles; also, that to avoid such detention it was recommended that owners of yachts should be advised to hoist the plain red ensign (i.e. the red ensign undefaced by any distinguishing Club mark) when wishing to pass the Dardanelles and during their sojourn in Turkish waters.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Assistant Civil Engineer in the Department of the Director of Engineering and Architectural Works in the Admiralty, at the Head Office and the Outports. (Supplementary to the General Regulations respecting Open Competitive Examinations for situations in the Civil Service included in Schedule A of the Order in Council of 4th June 1870.)

- N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.
- I. The limits of age for this situation are 23 and 28. Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.
- II. Candidates will be required to show what technical education and practical training they have undergone to qualify themselves for a situation of this nature. They must show to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners (1) that they have served, for at least three years, in a public or private office, under a Civil Engineer or Architect in good general practice, or a Super-intending Engineer of one of His Majesty's Dockyards or a Commanding Royal Engineer; or (2) that they have in some other capacity acquired a three years' practical experience on important works; and (3) that they have fully profited by their practical training, and possess the necessary qualifications and experience. Evidence on these points must be sent in at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint. If it prove prima facie satisfactory, the Candidate will be admitted to Examination, subject to such further inquiry as may be necessary.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

HAMILTON, MOTHERWELL, AND WISHAW TRAMWAYS COMPANY.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Bye-Laws and Regulations have been made by the Hamilton, Motherwell, and Wishaw Tramways Company under the powers conferred on the Company by the Hamilton, Motherwell, and Wishaw Tramways Act, 1900, and the various Tramway Acts incorporated therewith, for regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage belonging to the Company.

1. The Bye-Laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company, and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-Laws or Regulations.

 Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage.

4. No person shall spit in or upon any part of a carriage.

5. No person shall while travelling in or upon any carriage shout, sing, or create any disturbance, or play or perform upon any musical instrument.

6. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

7. No person shall swear or use profane, obscene, or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in, or upon, or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

8. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushiens or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice in er on the carriage, or break or acratch any window ef, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty prescribed by these Bye-Laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

9. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage or the dress of clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conducter, might, for any other reason, be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain upon any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the carriage, and shall not enter the carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor; and, if found in the carriage, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

10. Each passenger shall, on demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company the fare 'cgally demandable for the journey.

- 11. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also, when required to do so, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled ever by any such person.
- 12. No person shall take with him personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers), of more than 28 lbs. in weight, and such luggage shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.
- and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

 13. Any person claiming to be carried at a cheap fare as an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer shall, on demand of the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, give his correct name and address and occupation, and any such person making any false and fraudulent statement as to the same, or otherwise falsely and fraudulently representing himself to be an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer shall be liable to the penalty provided by these Bye-Laws and Regulations.
- 14. No person, not being a servant of the Company, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platform of any carriage, or stand on the roof or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and any person so travelling, standing, or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on the request of the conductor.
- 15. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein otherwise than in a manner provided for passengers.
- 16. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is constructed to carry, a conspicuous notice to that effect shall be placed on the carriage, and no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.
- 17. No person shall pull or sound the signal bells provided for use by the Company's servants, or handle or otherwise interfere with the controllers, brakes, trolley pole, wire, or other electric or working gear of the carriage, or of the electric equipment of the Tramways.
- 18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.
- 19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, or in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or cause any annoyance to passengers. - 21. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.
- 22. The conductor of each carriage is authorised to enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-Laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.
