\* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION,

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Second Class Technical Officer in the Engineer-in-Chief's Department of the General Post Office.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

I. The limits of age for this situation are 24 and 30. Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Examination.

II. Candidates will be required to show what technical education and practical training they have undergone to qualify themselves for a situation of this nature. They must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have actually served for at least three years under a firm of Electrical or Mechanical Engineers of good

standing. Evidence on these points must be sent in at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint. If it prove *prima facie* satisfactory, the Candidate will be admitted to examination, subject to such further inquiry as may be necessary.

III. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. English Composition.
2. Mathematics: (a) Arithmetic, Algebra, Plane and Solid Geometry, Trigonometry; (b) Differential and Integral Calculus.
3. Applied Mechanics.
4. Electricity and Magnetism.
5. Electrical Engineering and Electrical Instruments.
6. *Either* Steam, and Stationary Steam Engines, *or* Civil Engineering (including Designs of Structures).
7. French, *or* German, *or* Italian (Translation and Composition).

\* \* \* Subjects numbered 5 and 6 will include Drawing.

No Candidate will be eligible who does not pass, to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, in each of the subjects numbered 1, 2 (a), 3, 4, 5, and 6.

IV. A fee of £3 will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.

V. Applications for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for the situation of Second Class Technical Officer in the Engineer-in-Chief's Department of the General Post Office, will be held in London, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 8th November 1904.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 20th October, an application, in the handwriting of the Candidate, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

#### BURGH OF AUCHTERARDER.

##### NOTICE OF PROPOSED EXTENSION OF THE BURGH BOUNDARIES.

INTIMATION is hereby given that a Petition has been presented to the Sheriff of the County of Perth at Perth, by the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Auchterarder, praying the Court to Extend and Alter the Boundaries of the Burgh of Auchterarder for the purposes of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Acts, 1892 to 1903, by adding to the present Boundaries of the said Burgh the Area described as follows:—

Starting at the north-west corner of the march dyke between the Town Council's property of the Common Muir of Auchterarder and the Estate of Kincardine, and which is the march between Auchterarder and Blackford Parishes, and at a point about 40 yards south-west from the west-most Coal Bore Spring, and about 45 yards north-eastwards from "Granny Stane"; thence southwards, westwards and southwards and westwards along the march between the said properties of the Common Muir of Auchterarder and Kincardine Estate, to a point on the west side of the Muirhead Service Road; thence north-eastwards and northwards along the west side of the said service road to the highway leading from Perth to Stirling at a point at the north-east corner of the Auchterarder Parish Cemetery; thence westwards along the south side of said highway, a distance of 43 yards or thereby, to a point opposite the south end of the dyke which separates fields numbered 785 and 786 on the latest issue of the Ordnance Survey Map, 25 inch scale, and named "Geil's Quarry Park" and "North Second Howe Park" respectively; thence across said highway and north-westwards along said dyke to the wire fence which separates said fields from field numbered 783 on said map and named "East Railway Park"; thence south-westwards along said fence to the fence on the east side of the Crieff branch of the Caledonian Railway Company; thence northwards along said railway fence to the south side of the highway, known as the Orchill or Braco Road, leading from Auchterarder to Muirtown; thence across said highway and continuing onward in the same direction along the said railway fence to a point at north-west corner of field numbered 741 on said map, and known as "Market Park," being the march between the Town Council's said Common Muir Property and the Estate of Strathellan, and the march between Auchterarder and Blackford Parishes; thence north-eastwards along said march fence to the south side of the highway, known as the Tullibardine Road, leading from the west end of the Burgh to Tullibardine Station; thence eastwards along north fences of last

mentioned park, partly feued, which is numbered 741, 744, and 746 on said map, to a point opposite the north-west corner of small clump of wood numbered 734 on said map; thence across said last mentioned highway to said corner of clump of wood which is the march fence between the Town Council's said Common Muir Property and the lands of the Trustees of the late Mr. James Reid of Auchterarder; thence north-eastwards along the said march fence to a point at the north-east corner of Gallowhill Park numbered 747 on said map, which is the north-west corner of Isdale Park Feu; all lying in the Parish of Auchterarder and County of Perth;

as the present Burgh Boundaries are delineated and coloured green, and the proposed extension thereof hereinbefore described is delineated and coloured blue on the plan produced with said Petition; or in such manner as the Court shall seem proper; to appoint a Deliverance defining the new boundaries of the said Burgh along with this application to be recorded in the Sheriff Court Books of the County of Perth; and to find and declare that the whole expenses incurred by the Petitioners and by the Court in carrying out the proceedings under said Petition shall be defrayed out of the General Assessments to be levied within the said Burgh in terms of the said Acts.

Upon which Petition the said Sheriff has pronounced the following Deliverance:—

“Perth, 27th September 1904.—The Sheriff, having considered the foregoing application, appoints the Pursuers to give notice of the import thereof and of this Deliverance by advertisement in the Edinburgh Gazette and in the Strathern Herald newspaper, and by hand bills posted up in the area proposed to be included within the extended boundaries of the Burgh of Auchterarder; allows any person desiring to oppose the prayer of the Petition, or to be heard in reference thereto, to give notice thereof by lodging a Notice of Appearance with the Sheriff-Clerk of the County of Perth at Perth, within fourteen days from the last date of said advertisement; appoints the Petition and relative plan and other writs to remain in the Office of the said Sheriff-Clerk till the further orders of Court for inspection by all concerned; and remits to Joseph Hill, Registrar of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, Auchterarder, to ascertain approximately the number of the population and of the dwelling-houses within the area proposed to be included within the said extended boundaries, and to report *quam primum* and generally as to the circumstances averred by the Pursuers.
