WHEREAS by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1904," it is (among other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to specify new fees to be paid in respect of the verification and stamping of weights, measures, and weighing and measuring instruments in substitution for the fees specified in the First Schedule to the Weights and Measures Act, 1889, and, as from the date on which the Order in Council comes into operation the enactment mentioned in Part II. of the Schedule to this Act shall be repealed to the extent specified in the third column to that Schedule:

And whereas the Board of Trade have represented to His Majesty that it would be expedient to specify new fees to be taken in respect of the verification and stamping by Inspectors of Weights and Measures of the weights and measures in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereto:

And whereas it has been made to appear that the fees specified in the Schedule hereto are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the said Act, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the fees specified in the Schedule hereto annexed shall be taken accordingly in substitution for the fees specified in the First

Schedule to "The Weights and Measures Act, 1889."

This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of February 1905.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Secretary for Scotland has, under the provisions of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, made a Representation stating that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor by the Sheriff-Substitute of Lanarkshire at Hamilton, finding that the public Burying Ground known as St. Ninian's Churchyard, lying in the Parish of Stonehouse and County of Lanark, is in a condition which is offensive and contrary to decency:

And whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that the said public Burying Ground situated at the Parish Church in the Parish of Stonehouse and County of Lanark, known as St. Ninian's Churchyard, should be closed as a place of sepulture except for the burial of any widow or widower whose husband or wife has been buried in the said Burying Ground, and under reservation (first) of the right of interment of John Mitchell, Physician and Surgeon, Arnold House, Silloth, and Jane Mitchell, Branxton, Stonehouse, in lot No. 379 of said Burying Ground, and (second) of the right of interment to members of a family in those graves in which a member of said family has been interred since 1st January 1891, and from which, to make room for such interment, the bones have been collected and redeposited at a depth of seven feet, as such graves are shown on the list No. 3/7 of the proceedings before the Sheriff of Lanarkshire at Hamilton for the closing of said Burying Ground, which list is retained in the hands of the Sheriff-Clerk at Hamilton; provided, however, that the number of interments in each of said graves shall not exceed three, and subject to the further conditions as regards all interments after the date of the Order in Council directing the closing of the said Burying Ground, that the exercise of the right of burial shall not be injurious to public health or offensive or contrary to decency, and that notice be given to the Sanitary Inspector on the day preceding that on which a grave is to be opened, and that no interment shall be made unless the coffin can be laid at a depth of four feet from the surface of the ground to the upper side of the coffin, and that without the exposure of another coffin.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the 28th day of February next:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order, or notice thereof, be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies of this Order, or notice thereof, be affixed, as required by the above-mentioned Act, on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before such Representation is so considered.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 10TH JANUARY 1905.)

MARKETS AND FAIRS (WEIGHING OF CATTLE) RETURNS ORDER OF 1905.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Markets and Fairs (Weighing of Cattle) Acts, 1887 and 1891, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The places from which returns shall, after the commencement of this Order, be required to be made under the Markets and Fairs (Weighing of Cattle) Act, 1891, are specified in the First Schedule to this Order.

2. The market authority of every market held in any of the places specified in the First Schedule to this Order, and every auctioneer who sells cattle, sheep, or swine at any mart where cattle, sheep, or swine are habitually or periodically sold in any of the said specified places, shall, on the last market day in every week, send to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries a return in the form A specified in the Second Schedule to this Order, setting forth the number of cattle, sheep, and swine entering the market or mart, and the number of cattle, sheep, and swine weighed at the market or mart during the week, and also, as regards the places specified in the First Part of the First Schedule to this Order) returns in the forms B 1 and B 2, and as regards the places specified in the Second Part of such Schedule returns in the forms C 1 and C 2, showing the prices of the cattle, sheep, and swine, fat and store respectively, sold during the week at the market or mart; and such returns shall contain the particulars indicated in the said forms, so far as the market authority or the auctioneer, as the case may be, can ascertain the same.

3. The Orders specified in the Third Schedule to this Order are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked.

4. This Order may be cited as the MARKETS AND FAIRS (WEIGHING OF CATTLE) RETURNS ORDER OF 1905.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the sixteenth day of January nineteen hundred and five.
